Bri Carb and Benny Goodman, among others, made canoe paddles and Jon Stern and Steve Weinstein did some outstanding work with stained glass.

Next door in the ceramics shop the Squires turned out some quite imaginative and creative work, though there was less activity here than we expected. Jon Freyberg, Pete Madan, Bobby Channick, Steve Weinstein and Carl Offit all presented themselves fairly frequently.

With our sandwiches in one hand and our passports in the other we stomped off for Expo. Remember the lines at the gate, and the harrowing ride on the Expo Express?

It was a great day, full of excitement, that too quickly came to an end. As the Squires ran and the counselors dragged to the bus, everyone knew that Expo 67 was the highlight of the year.

After three days at Expo and one day touring Montreal, including Belmont Park where we blew all the money we had left on rides, and we were ready to return to camp. Remember the roller coaster ride and the airplanes?

The last day, we left the camping area about 4.30 p.m. arriving at Robin Hood at 11.30 that night. The whole group was worn out and went right to sleep. We'll never forget the bus ride back, the meal as we drove, and the crate of oranges that Customs wouldn't admit until we had peeled them all. The trip to Expo was more than a high point of the summer; it was something that we'll remember all our lives.

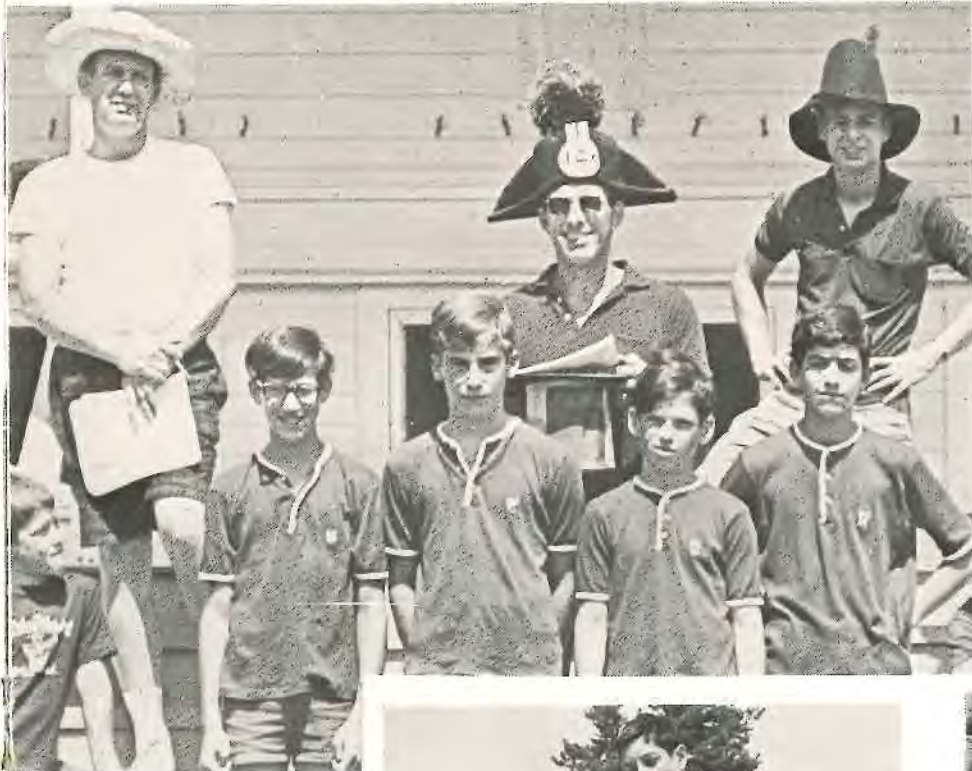

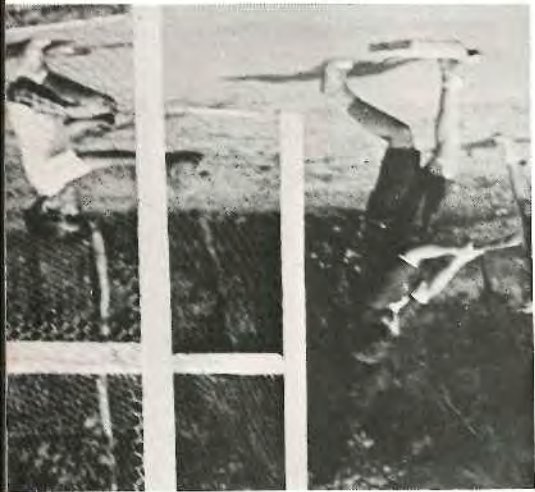

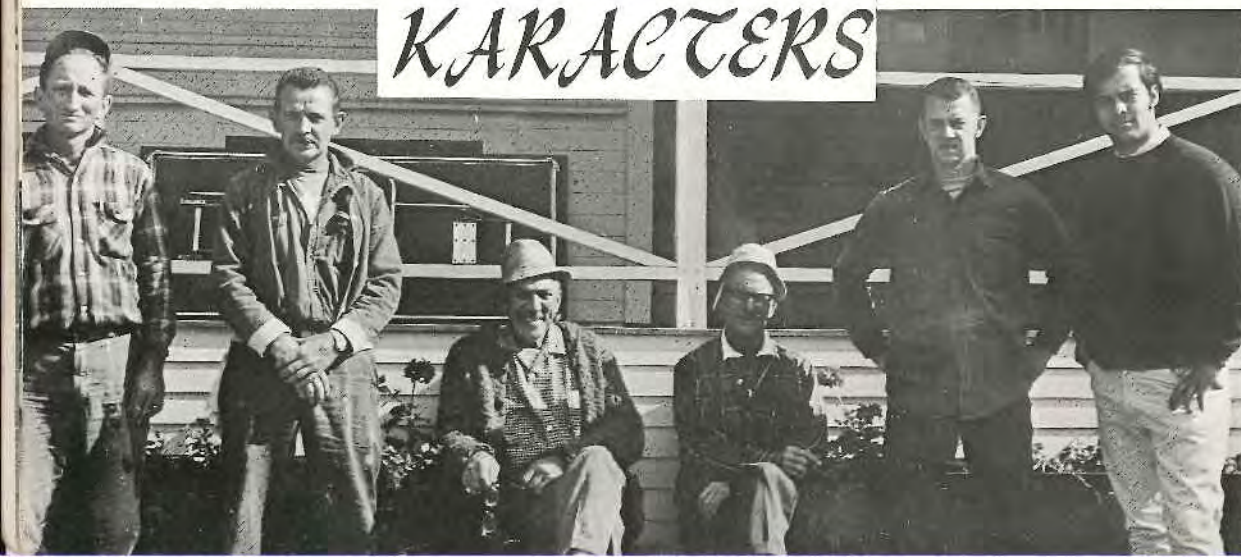

KARACTERS*





A shining, large-mouthed bass turns in a ten-gallon tank. A sparrow, chestnut-pated and clear-breasted, picks up a millet seed at the tray feeder. Slowly and deliberately a Polyphemus caterpillar pulls a birch leaf about itself to hide its cocoon. Above on the open rafters, Aranea sericata, the one we named the Beam Spider, pulls taut another strand of its orb. Ar-ar-onk comes the voice of the bullfrog from the fish pool. A spore-puff, erupted by a jumping toad, vivifies the mushroom terrarium. Silvery-white gleams a mica sheet, fourteen inches broad, taken from a mile-high mine.

Any of these diverting sights and sounds could attract a camper's attention as he enters the Robin Hood Nature Museum. Nature is spelled with a capital letter by the versatile and eager-minded merry-men of Sherwood Forest.

Our nature program this year as ever, was pegged on the time-tested wisdom: "We will study the things of the out-of-doors which there make their homes." Animal behaviour can be observed a little better in controlled situations, so we did watch caged specimens when desirable. As it turned out, our whole field of study went beyond the confines of the camp and Broad Bay, including northern New Hampshire and Vermont, and even adjacent Quebec in Canada. Catching, collecting and conversing - the three C's - was our technique in enlarging awareness and understanding in a successful nature program at camp.

Nature Bob's two rabbits, the albino Jumper and obsidian-jet Drummer attracted at once our seven and eight year olders, the Tinkers and Pagers. How amazed they were to find the rabbits better plant-spotters than they themselves, picking out the clovers (red, white or yellow), turning down their hare-lips at milkweeds and dogbanes. "So, it is important to know your plants to feed a rabbit", opined Steve Harris, as he kept turning over his bird and insect identification cards he carried with him. Andy Brown proved himself a woodsman-aborning as he led the way through the pine forests to a Bank Swallow colony, ahead of Quixotic Nature Bob, wearing a Mexican straw hat and carrying a collapsible bamboo pole, marked off in red every foot of its twelve feet, so we could probe holes to see how deep they were. Everyone wanted to tote Nature Bob's pointer, so helpful in directing eyes to just the right spot to focus on moving form in the tree boughs above. We saw at least eight chipmunk holes, two woodchuck homes (each with front and back door), and what everyone agreed was a fox den on that exploration trip to the gravel pit. Another time Josh Gilman and Tony Bernheim were proud to find just the right kind of rocky bottom from the lake for the museum's important aquarium.

The earth's physical forces interested the Jugglers. After one rainy day's nature lesson in the museum, Mike Crowley made a clay volcano to hold ignited chemicals. The Squires found, after a long look at the topographic map, that the glacial formed lakes were compass needles, - narrow east and west, long north and south. Even a field trip for sixteen year old Saxons proved that a glacial bog with pitcher plants and an erratic boulder at Madison could be impressive. The Archers followed investigations to the point of making soil tests. Mark Abeshouse, Andy Greif and Moss Sidell finally agreeing on just what dirt was typical sample material of this outwash plain. Lancer Mike Tint's thoughts were on U.F.O.'s as reported in his summer edition of Saucer News, and it was Mike who knew just when the meteorid showers were to occur in August.

Just below the Nature Museum, even closer to the clear waters of Broad Bay, is perched the Yeomen bunkhouse, Nature Bob's own bailiwick. Five Yeomen rock-hounds, Richard Carr, Mike Madan, Joel Packer, Tony Rafel and Michael Samuels, accompanied Nature Bob on the fabulous trip-of-trips that ended up at Expo '67. Leaving at 6:00 a.m. from Camp they were to arrive at sundown across the bridge at Montreal at the Champlain campground. On the way they were to collect specimens at a talc mine in the Green Mountains of Vermont, see the largest U.S. asbestos plant of the Ruberoid Company, and even pan for gold! Yes, there's gold in "them thar hills" of the White Mountains as lucky Tony Rafel could tell you. Mike Madan and Richard Carr obtained some good rocks as usual. Expo '67 meant just a little more to these campers, since they already realized the importance of mines and minerals. They found now they were crucial to the Canadian economy, a fact brought out by the giant samples at the Canadian Pavilion and two others: - Quebec and the four Western Provinces. What they were surprised to find out was the world-wide concern with rocks and minerals. Can they now forget one corner of the Russian Pavilion, two exhibits among the African countries, or the central motif of one of the themes on Man and his World? Impressed with photos in Quebec Province's building, our group returned to camp over the dirt back roads of Quebec to visit the Johns Manville asbestos open-pit quarry in the town of Asbestos, Quebec. Tony Rafel was disappointed to have to shoot off his fireworks at the crossing point at Pittsburgh, New Hampshire, since these are contraband in this State. Everyone else enjoyed the celebration of our great return.

July was a good month for mushrooms. The Squires enjoyed two trips over the wild Nature Trail Annex to collect White Lactars (Lactarius deliciosus), Emetic Russulas, and one huge Edible Bolete along with the Gemmed Puffballs. Mark Freedman was happy to add the mushroom symbol to his Nature Strip of accomplishment. He came to recognize the distinction between poisonous and non-poisonous forms.

August means acquainting ourselves with insects now that the birds are silent. The nesting bluebirds and some fourteen barn swallow clutches were a-wing or away now. Squire Robbie Issow brought a Polyphemus caterpillar back from a Wednesday evening cookout. The Archers became most enthusiastic at butterfly catching, learning to their surprise how butterflies were often well-named flutter-bys. Seth Kaplan, Mark Greenberg and Mark Abeshouse did quite well on several trips afield. Wasn't it Mark who first added a female Cabbage Butterfly to our collection?

Our former All-Camp Nature Award winners, Drew Schraffran and Gary Hecker showed much enthusiasm at times. We were glad to see Drew's Gray Squirrel again, now three years old. The White team, during Green and White Competition, owes much to Drew's twelve frogs, four fish and three turtles. Gary caught Nature Bob some frogs and helped collect water plants on their trip with other Lancers to the Lake's island. The Aquarium owes much to Mike Madan for his fish.

This summer was quite different. Expo 67 was unforgettable. It was good to be there with some of the Squires, to help Peter Madan identify his Leopard Frog, and with all of the Yeomen, all under the leadership of Bill Fisher and watchful eye of our guide to Montreal and the St. Lawrence Seaway, Drew Friedman. All the "nature people", as we have been called, would sincerely like to thank Andy, Duff, Major and Wally Case for this grand opportunity.





'67 was a good year for the Shack. Moving into a new location for this year, operations got off to a late start, but really rolled once they began. Two classes were formed, and an even more extensive program will be initiated next summer. Only a very general outline could be presented to one class consisting mostly of Squires, while a group of Archers seemed more interested in learning the code.

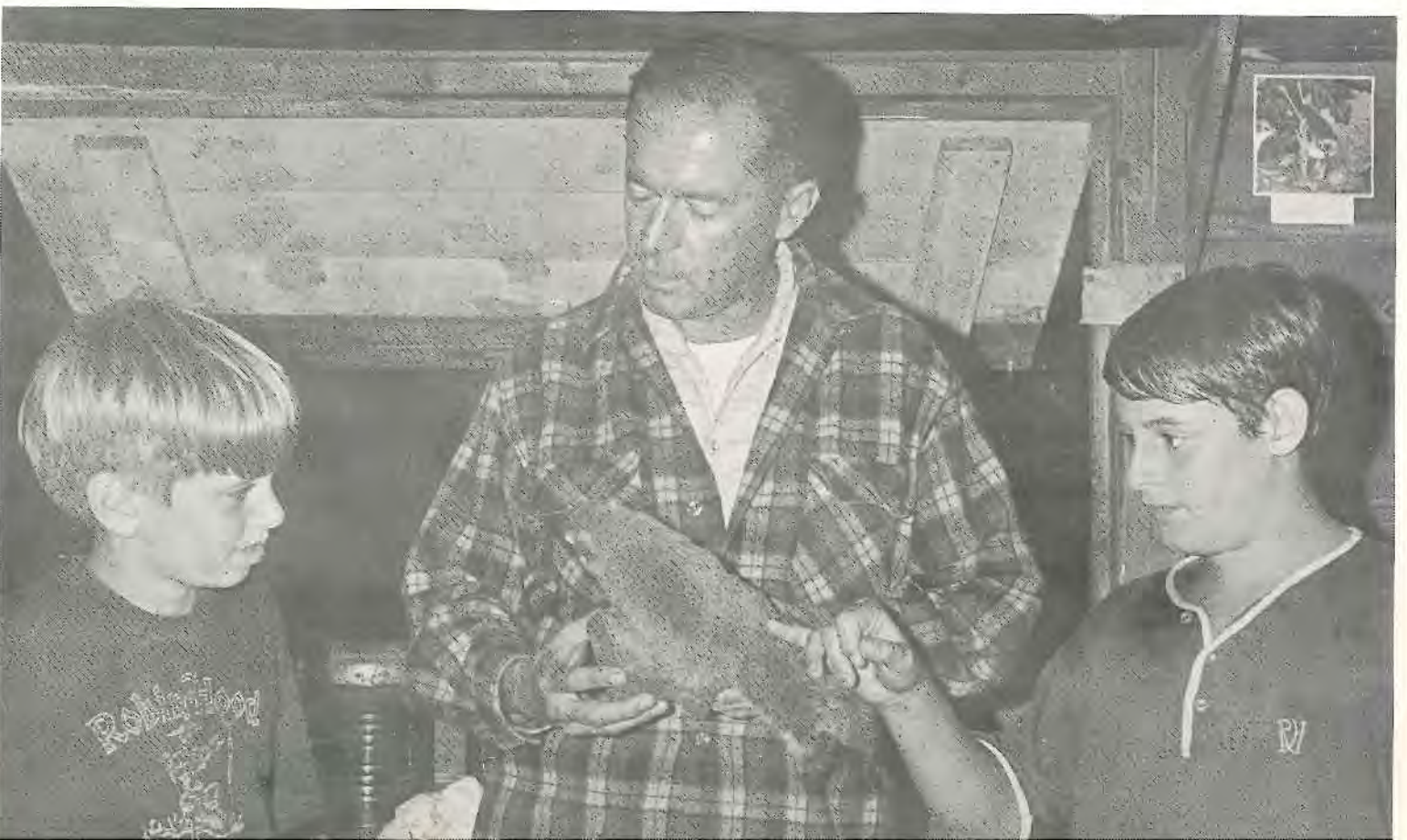

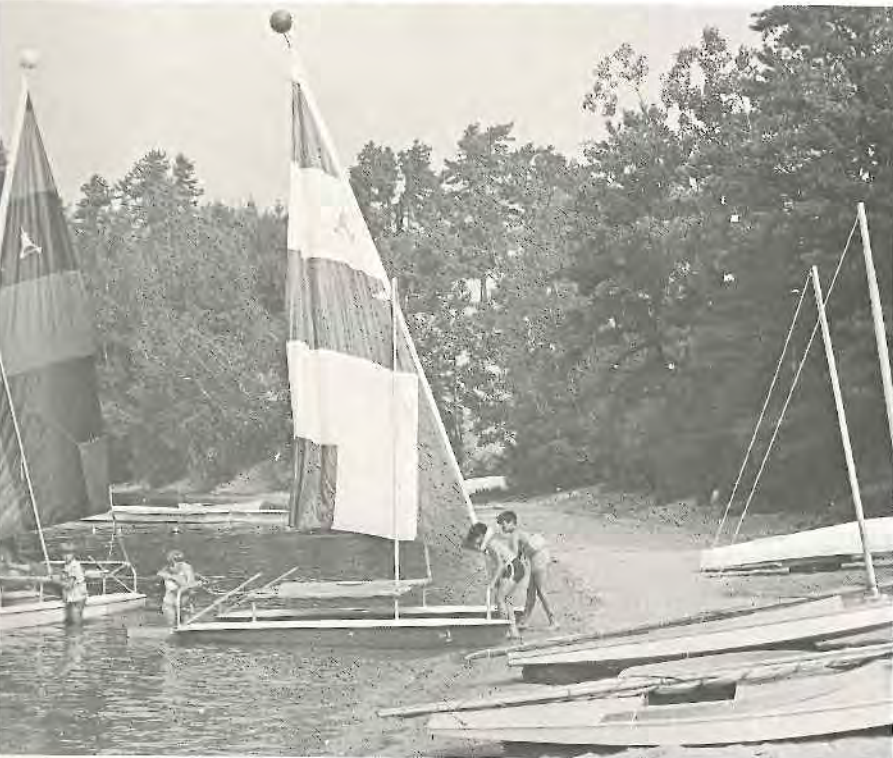

The Yeomen proved to be the most active group, and I expect many divers from their ranks next year.

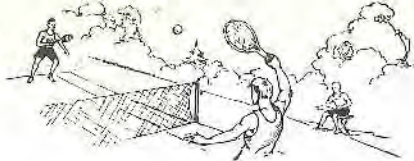

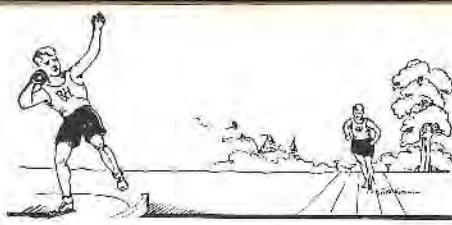

Self-confidence, water safety and enjoyment in the water are our major goals of the swimming program here at Robin Hood. Instruction is given to the individual camper at his own particular level of ability. Classes are held for beginners, advanced beginners, intermediate swimmers, junior and senior life saving, and basic and advanced survival. The first order of business usually is the traditional passing of the sixteen lap test which is equal to swimming 400 yards. Next comes the forty lap test and following that the island swim. The distance to the island is a little over a half mile. Drown proofing, which is a method of swimming in the water indefinitely using the minimum of exertion was once again demonstrated to all campers and many were able to pass the test for twenty minutes. (Members of the Peace Corps must pass this test for a period of four hours).

The Tinkers, Pagers and Jugglers came to the waterfront for daily instruction this summer. Each camper, depending on his particular skill, was placed in a class. These classes were for the beginning swimmer, and for those who needed work on either the front or back crawl, the breast stroke, the side stroke, conditioning or in diving.

The Tinkers, Pagers and Jugglers were involved in many swimming meets within their groups. 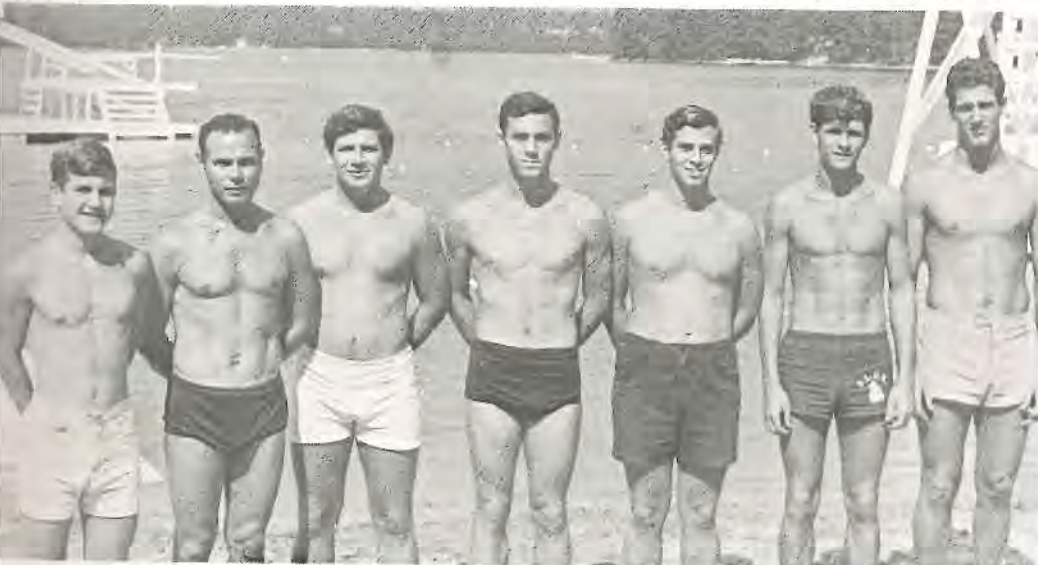

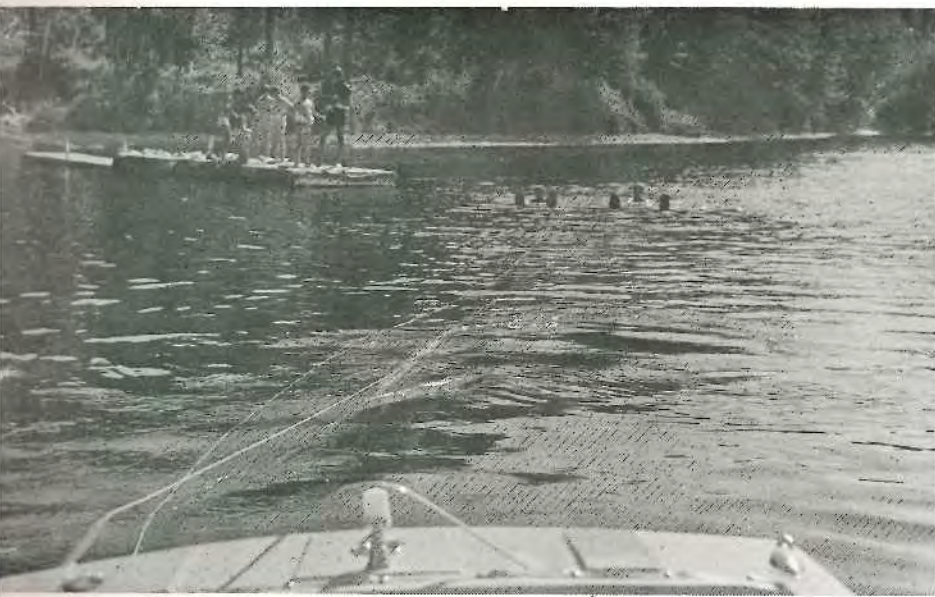
