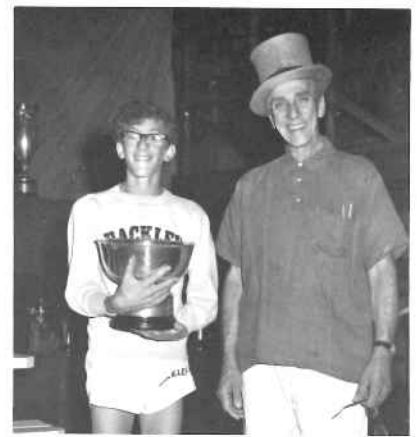

We played baseball often, especially with the Squires. The most noticeable improvement was made by Tom Cannold, Tom Diehl, Bob Jacob, and Jim Sperber. All became more valuable assets to their teams. Sluggers Stuart Fischbach, Doug Ellenoff, and Jon Cott always kept the other team's outfielders on their toes. Drew Lazarus and Paul Blankman on first base got there with the ball many times before the batter. Encouragement was always provided by Eric Tinsley, spectacular slides by Doug Ellenoff and Drew Schattman, and coaching by Fred Weiler. "For once in a trillion years catch the ball Bernheim." The Jugs improved their hitting and most of all their anticipation in fielding. With the fine coaching of Tony Etkind (Unkind), soccer was introduced for the first time, seriously, to the Jugs, and Wow! What a response. We began to play our positions, we began to pass, we began to dribble the ball, we began to enjoy soccer as much as baseball. Tony Bernheim and David Ahlert were formidable forwards, while Steve Gilberg, Reed Siegel, Stuart Fischbach and Jimmy Sperber played fearlessly and reliably as half-backs, providing a strong defense. Doug Ellenoff played so well in goal, fearlessly to dive at any shot, that he played for his team in the Junior Camp Watermelon League. A camper was overheard quizzing one of our Friars the last day about Friar activities. I taped the interview, and herewith are some selected replies:

"But award winners were just the best of an excellent crew -- the rest of us were right near the top, too. Can you find a better waterpolo team than Maury at guard-forward, Mike Baylin in the hole, Eric and Allen Stieglitz at forwards, Kenny Solomon and Rich Carr at guards, and Mike Samuels in the goal? And look at our subs: Bob Broida and Rich King in the goal, Mike Madan and Scott Grosfeld at forwards, and Jon Kruth and Buzzy on defense. Man, unbelievable. Didn't we demolish the Foresters, 3 games to 1?"

"We were even better in scuba than in waterpolo. Besides the top four I already mentioned we had Jeff Jones, Scott Grosfeld, Danny Mades, Myles Friedman, Bob Broida, and one or two others who practically lived at scuba. Without Scotty Greenstein's tireless assistance, Robin Hood wouldn't have had a successful diving program this summer, if any diving program at all. We were the best in sailing. In addition to Joel and Mike, there were Kenny, Dave Peckar, Danny, Rich Carr, Gary Fruchtman, Mike Baylin, Jon Kruth, Eddie Levinstone, and more. In skiing Maury was tops, but right behind him were Bobby Miller, Danny, Dave, Rich King, Scott Grosfeld, Jeff, Allen, and a number of others. In swimming, Maury first, Mike Baylin second, and Scott Grosfeld third made a pretty strong top three. And the rest of the group was close, too. But the best Friar swimming performance was by Bobby Miller, who spent nearly every morning patiently teaching swimming to Junior campers -- which is quite a chore. In addition to Greenstein and Miller, who did the work of counselors, Dave Peckar did a great job teaching photography. But it isn't so surprising that we had three campers who were in reality counselors, because we had at least three counselors who were in reality campers.

"Our favorite land sport had to be volleyball, although some might say basketball. No other group in camp could touch us for hours spent on the volleyball court. Do you think you could find a better net player than Harvey Baum, a better set-up man than Gary Fruchtman, a better server than Louie Schafel, or a better all-around man than Allen Stieglitz? And how about Mike Samuels, Eddie Levinstone, Mike Madan, Eric Stieglitz, Mike Baylin, Rich Carr, and Tommy Kornreich?"

Basketball was popular. The starting team was Kenny Solomon and Scott Grosfeld at forwards, Maury Levin at center, and Louie and Tommy Kornreich at guards. The bench was just as strong with Mike Samuels and Buzz Billik at forwards, Rich King at center, and Johnny O. and Myles at guards -- a lot of good ballplayers. Softball, soccer, and football didn't really command the interest that they should have. We had our individual stars -- Buzzy and Harvey (the best pitcher in camp) in softball, Scott Grosfeld, Kenny and Rich Carr in football, and Mike Baylin and Johnny O. in soccer. In riflery and riding only Scott Grosfeld showed any real interest. In tennis, only Johnny O. and Tommy K.; tripcrafts, Eddie Levinstone and Danny Mades; archery, Mike Baylin and Allen Stieglitz. We were good in golf, track, ping pong, wrestling, boating, canoeing, and especially body-surfing. But sports aren't everything. We had a lot of success with activities like photography with Jeff Jones and Bob Broida, music with Bobby Miller, stagecrafts with Allen Stieglitz, and dramatics with Jeff Jones.

"For trips we went to Ogunquit, to the movies a couple of times, and to socials, but our best trip was the excursion. It was limited to 12 Friars and three days, but man, it was worth it. The first day was Hampton Beach, and we slept in a motel -- wild. The second day -- Salisbury Beach, not as nice as Hampton, nor nearly so clean, but a good boardwalk and an amusement park. And that night: back to Hampton for Blood, Sweat, and Tears in concert. They sang all their hits: Spinning Wheel, If I Should Die, You Made Me So Very Happy, Sometimes in Winter, etc., and they were on stage for an hour and a half. The last day was Old Orchard and the world body-surfing championships. The weather was perfect, the waves were ideal, and the competition was fierce. Maury was good, and Louie, Tommy K., Danny, and Gary showed some flashes of brilliance, but there was really no question about who was the best. Even when muscle-beach made his somewhat impressive showing (using illegal tactics, I might add), the trophy had to be awarded to you-know-who. And he never let us forget it, either. The whole trip was great, and the season was great, too."

Dave Peckar was with the group...Herm Diehl inspected the back porch during Green and White... Mike Samuels talked...Mike Madan stopped talking...Jeff Jones played trombone for flag raising... Jon Kruth wasn't playing his tapes...Bobby Miller taught Bob Gilbert guitar...everyone slept through breakfast (how about it, Coy)...the lights went out...Danny Mades wasn't devoured...Tommy Kornreich beat the gin playing champion of North America (a bad day)...Rich King degouted 25 oranges...Rich King and Gary Fruchtman ate corn, and ate corn, and ate corn...Joel Packer wasn't sailing...Eric Stieglitz wasn't smiling...Myles Friedman shot a lay-up off the correct foot...Rich Carr didn't foul out of a waterpolo game...Gary Fruchtman had woman troubles?? 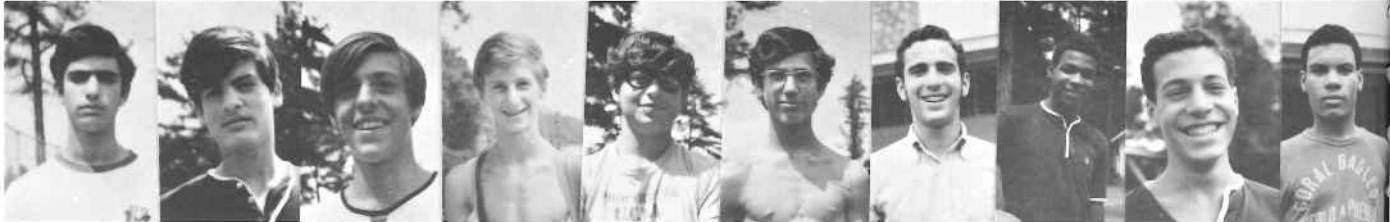

Surely the great leaders of tomorrow would develop in the summer of 1969 in King's Castle. So it was for eight weeks these twenty-one participated in and learned from a program which emphasized sports and games.

The Foresters were blessed with several exceptional softball players this year. The starting team: Benjie Kirschenbaum (.328 BA, 41 HR, 102 RBI), 1B - a stellar player at bat and on the field. Also adequate at short stop. Dick Abrams (.133 BA, OHR, IRBI), 2B, a former Brookline, Mass., Little League all star who "tried" to be the sparkplug of the team. Had a respectable .987 fielding average. Bob Holzwasser (.303 BA, 44 HR, 113 RBI), SS, a strong pull hitter who was one of the most feared players. Scott Friedman (.301 BA, 38 HR, 101 RBI), 3B, has both Indian and Redleg scouts on his trail. Andy Caster (.299 BA, 12 HR, 36 RBI), LF, a sure fielding speed demon. Will probably develop in the Florida Instructional League. David Harris (.303 BA, 2 HR, 33 RBI), CF; an early season "fielding mishap" slowed his progress. Does he want it enough? Howard Feuer (.456, 62 HR, 197 RBI), RF, the hottest hitter in Eastern seaboard camps. Has all the tools. Tom Aronson (.363 BA, 41 HR, 133 RBI), C, strong arm, strong bat, good drive. Jim Katz (.343, 7 HR, 43 RBI), OF, fantastic wrist hitter. Dave Goldberg (.361, 13 HR, 44 RBI), IF, limited action due to his thespian interests. Jay Kotler (.351, 0 HR, 2 RBI), IF-OF, Mr. Desire. John Weinstein (.343, 2 HR, 17 RBI), OF, great in clutch. Steve Platt (32W-6L, 1.01 ERA), P, found his control this year. Has the blazing fast one to go along with a change-up. Drew Schaffran (16W-3L, 1.92 ERA), P, outstanding control.

The first game was a night tilt against the Friars. Steve Platt's pitching, along with a tough defense, gave the Foresters a 3-0 decision. Next the Foresters hosted the Saxons in an away game (?). Somehow we lost. The final game was a rematch with the Friars. Bolstered by several hard-hitting recruits from the Center Ossipee Saints, the Friars proved to be a tougher match this time. After being behind 5-0 we fought back with 12 runs in the last 3 innings to make it a 14-7 final.

The '69 Foresters represented Center Ossipee's NFL franchise. Our main signal caller was Howie Feuer, who had a 69.7% pass completion average. Offensive ends Steve Carlson and Dave Goldberg had both size and speed. On the ground halfbacks Steve Hazelwood and Bob Holzwasser both averaged over 5 yards per carry. Wingback Andy Caster was also indispensable. The defense was bolstered by the "big four" of Dick Abrams, Scott Friedman, Chick Steinberg and Gary Hopen. Steve Platt called the defensive signals from the middle line-backer position. Dave Grant was the kickoff and punt return specialist. Suicide squad members were: John Weinstein, Frank Zuch, Drew Schaffran, Jay Kotler, Benjie Kirschenbaum, Jim Katz, Brad Hylan, Dave Harris, and Tom Aronson.

Waterskiing was one of the most popular individual activities in the Forester group. Frank Zuch and Brad Hylan were the most skilled. Other ardent performers were: Chick Steinberg, Howie Feuer, Steve Platt, and Steve Hazelwood. Dave "hit it" Harris showed remarkable progress. The shot gunning award this year went to Howie Feuer, with honorable mention to Jay Kotler, and greatest progress to "The Wood." There were a few events which drew considerable acclaim for the Foresters on the docks this year -- (1) Chick Steinberg knocking down the chick he was skiing with, (2) Frank Zuch failing to do a dock start in the presence of S.R. Platt, (3) Dick Abrams and "the boys" coming down to watch a certain girl named Meryl ski, (4) Howie Feuer promising to be a better skier than Chick by the end of the season (nice try, Howie).

Forester Drew Schaffran was the leading archer in camp this summer. Steve Hazelwood, Frank Zuch, and Brad Hylan also were among Robin Hood's best. Drew was one of the few campers in RH history to pass his American Archer. During Green and White Drew shot a 197, Scott had a fine 160, and Jay Kotler amazed the crowd with a 102.

Using the famed University of South Carolina 2-3 offense, Coach Spencer's basketball team really clicked. Who could ever forget OPEN and CLOSE? Scott Friedman was the floor general. He was the team's best shooting guard and top playmaker. Dick Abrams and his 2 handed jumper was another sparkplug. At one forward was Steve Hazelwood. The Newark Flash had a good shot and was a tough rebounder. Steve Carlson, the other forward, was the squad's most improved player. He was a rebounding cornerman in the tradition of Jerry Lucas. Center Steve Platt was the main scoring and rebounding threat. Much of his success was due to his attending the clinic last year. There were two games with the Saxons. The first one the Saxons won easily. Then Coach Spencer put the team through a vigorous training schedule. With the biggest crowd of the season on hand, the Foresters took commanding lead. At the half we were still up by one. A momentary offensive collapse in the third quarter led to our ultimate loss. It was our closest defeat ever. Against professional competition we fared better. Remember the hard fought 119-114 victory over the New York Knicks Rookie B - Squad? Steve Platt had 43 points, 11 assists, and 37 rebounds. Scott had 28, Steve Carlson 20, the Wood put in 14, the Cat popped 9, Dick Abrams chipped in with 5 points -- which, as he would let it be known, were undoubtedly the winning points of the game. The outlook for next year is good. Doctors are confident that the removal of a name from Dick Abrams' wrist will be successful. Cat's lip will be healed. But what about Scott's mouth? Others who had a big part in the successful Forester hoop campaign were: Tom Aronson, Andy Caster, Howie Feuer, Dave Goldberg, Dave Harris, Bob Holzwasser, Gary Hopen, Brad Hylan (great progress), Jim Katz, Benjie, Bolo, Drew, Chick, Frank Zuch and John Weinstein.

Certainly our best soccer player was John Weinstein. His presence was not seen in the scoring column, but on defense. We could always count on John to stop the fast break. Without a doubt if Dick Abrams was not our best forward he was certainly our best dressed forward. With his black knee socks and his Adidas soccer shoes he could do anything with the ball -- except put it in the goal. Another top scorer was Drew Schaffran. He ended the season with 24 goals, 17 assists. All our opponents dreaded Drew's scoring threat. Goalie Chick Steinberg always kept the opposition in "S.C." (shutout city). This season we found the W offense along with the 4-men frontline Big Red offense to be our main scoring threats. In 42 years the tennis courts of Robln Hood have never seen the likes of Andy Caster and Gary Hopen. Both were truly remarkable. Tom Aronson and Dave Harris were good players and great sportsmen. Track had Dave Goldberg, Steve Platt, Tom Aronson, Brad Hylan and David Hylan as dedicated followers. Jai Alai mastery was shown by Gary Hopen and Andy Caster. John Weinstein was tops in volleyball.

The Foresters as a group, and individually Dave Goldberg, were constantly out of camp. Our Ogunquit trip was characterized by "pick-up" and "crack-ups". The girls and the bus driver were most accommodating. The final tally: 12 girls and 4 signs. We made it back to camp safely. The bus, it just so happened, did not. A "sight seeing" tour of the Kancamagus Highway was next. A detour was taken to view Greely Pond. Steve Carlson was the only one daring enough to swim through the pond's leech population. 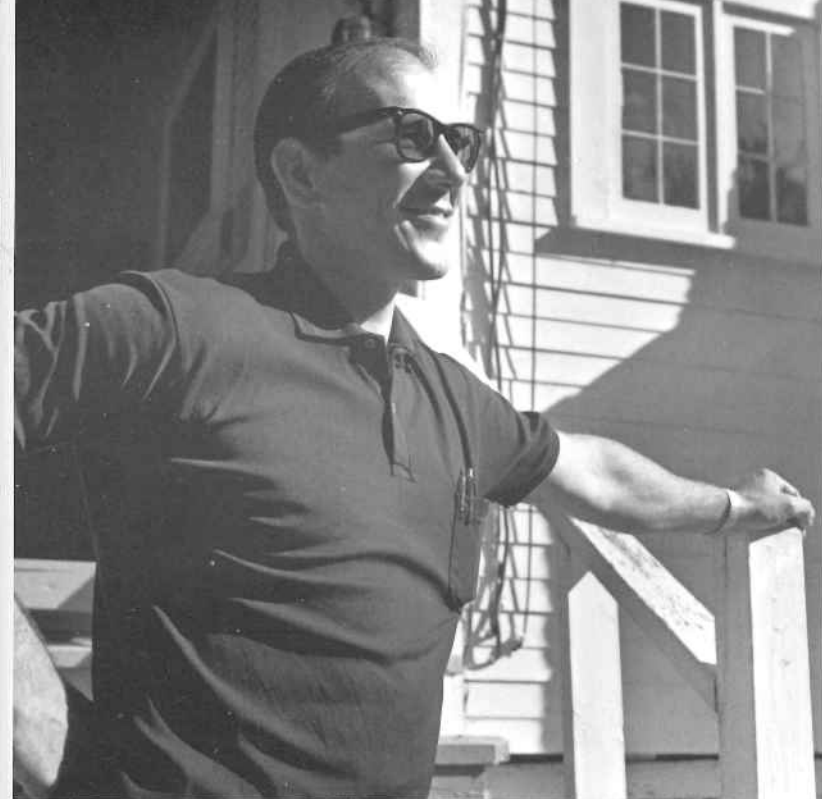

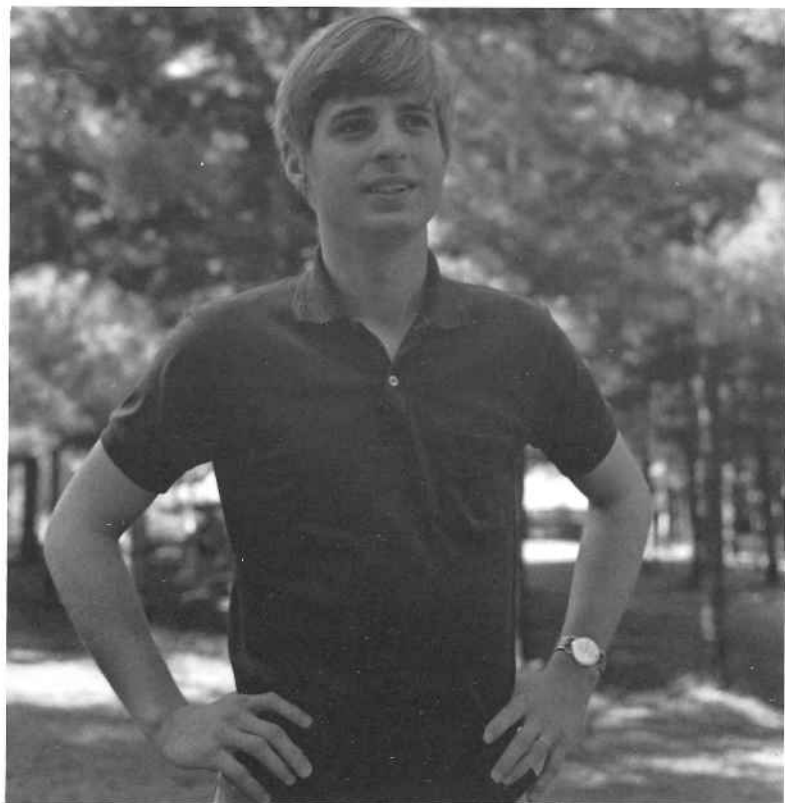

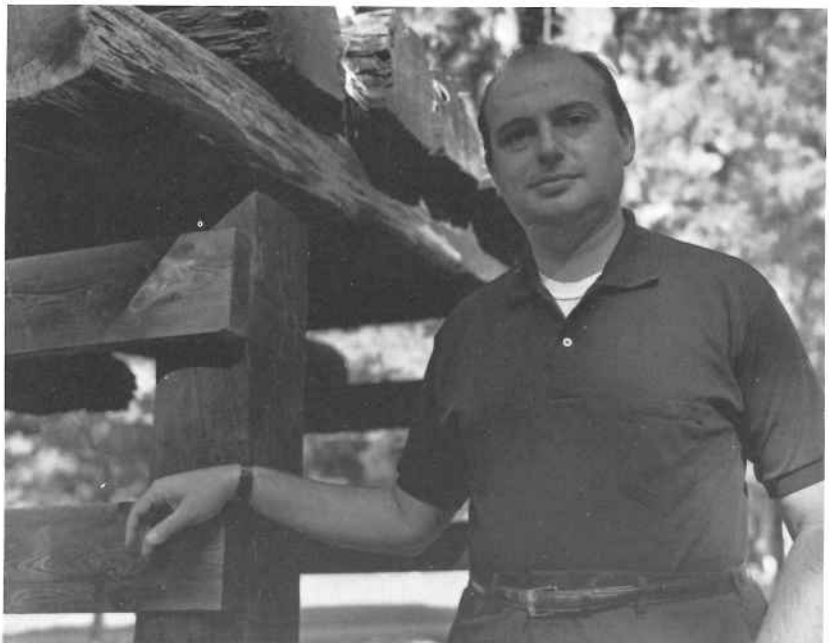

Archery, a sport demanding mental and physical alertness, requires that the archer notice small details, remedy minute errors, and achieve consistency.

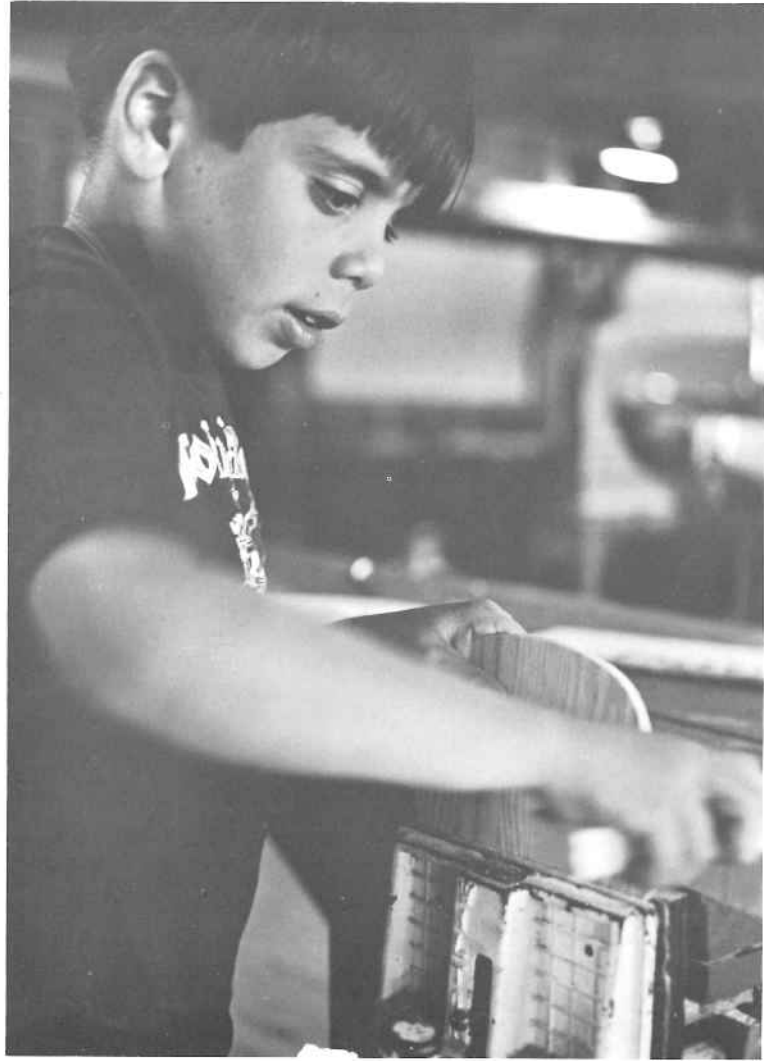

The next morning we cooked fancy oatmeal and hot tea, and Dave Harris tried to dry out his wet shoes next to the fire. Soon they were in the fire. They wouldn't stop moldering for half an hour. After breakfast we started climbing again. We met some other climbers on the Jefferson summit and Brad Hylan couldn't trade his beef jerky for a tuna fish sandwich. Of course Bob "the Animal" Holzwasser was on top of Mt. Washington an hour before all of us. Once on the top Dave Harris took the Cog Railway down because the trip wasn't hard enough for him, and he had some bad blisters. One of the Railway trains came off its track, and Dave was delayed for some time. We continued to the Lake of the Clouds Hut where Andy Caster and Steve Carlson went swimming, then 2 miles more to a spring between Mt. Franklin and Mt. Eisenhower. Bob Holzwasser was running ahead of the group, so we told him to do 50 pushups while he waited. He could only do 15. We camped above timber line, and when we woke up the wind was blowing about 40 mph and it looked like rain, so we skipped breakfast and hiked on to Mizpah Spring's Hut, then down to Crawford House where we were picked up by Chuck Downie.

It was a great tripping season, but just a taste of bigger and better trips planned for '70. See you then.
