And make yourself at home.

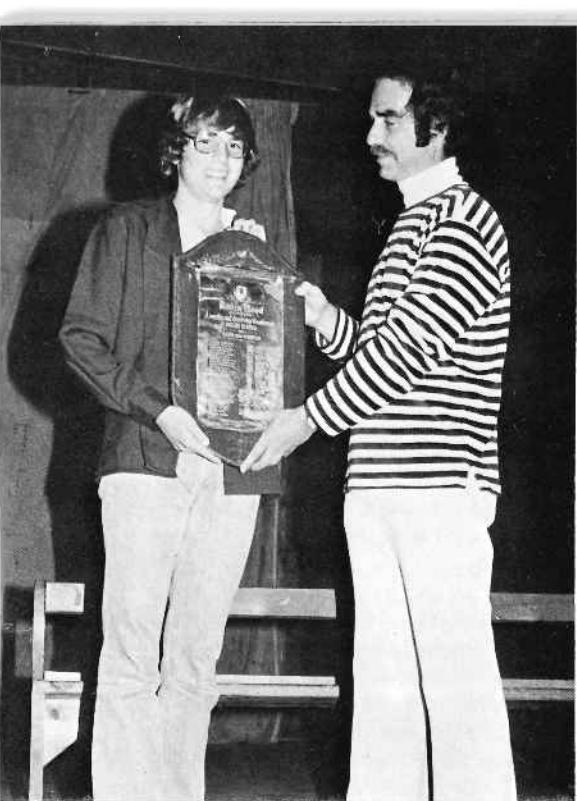
### 8. STAUNCH MEN OF ROBIN HOOD

While ROBIN HOOD's deep thunders roll.

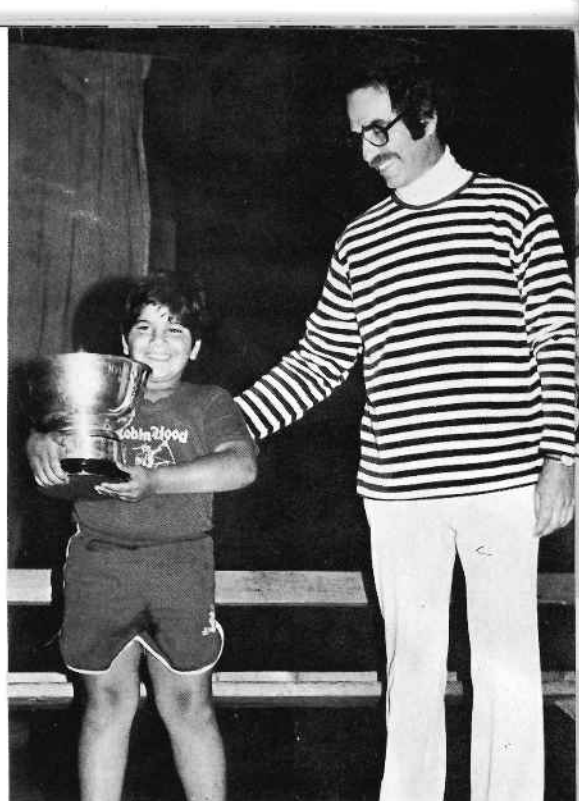

On June 26th Robin Hood's 52nd summer began with a new band of TPJs. There were five returning campers and 14 new ones ready to get the most out of camp. The TPJs were very active during camp, becoming involved in many team sports and individual activities. In basketball the TPJs worked very hard on shooting, passing and dribbling skills. 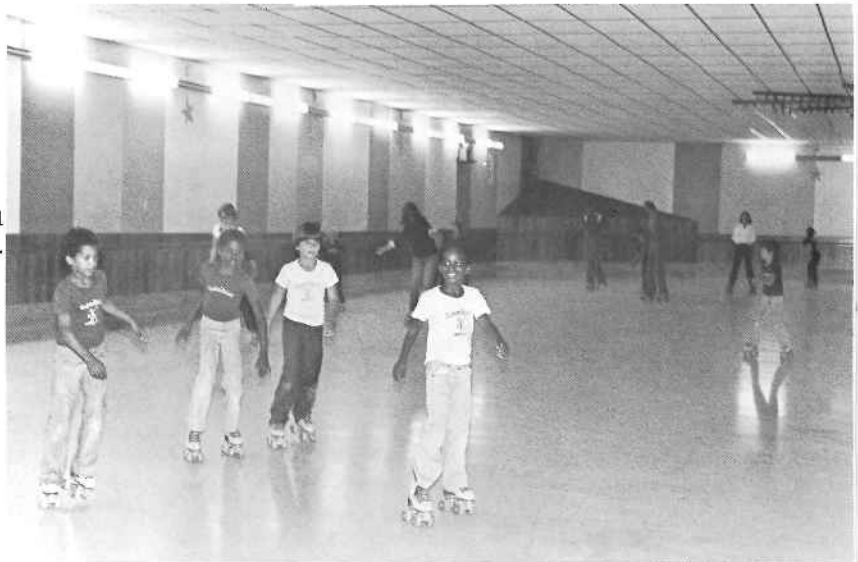
Green and White lasted five days, during which time



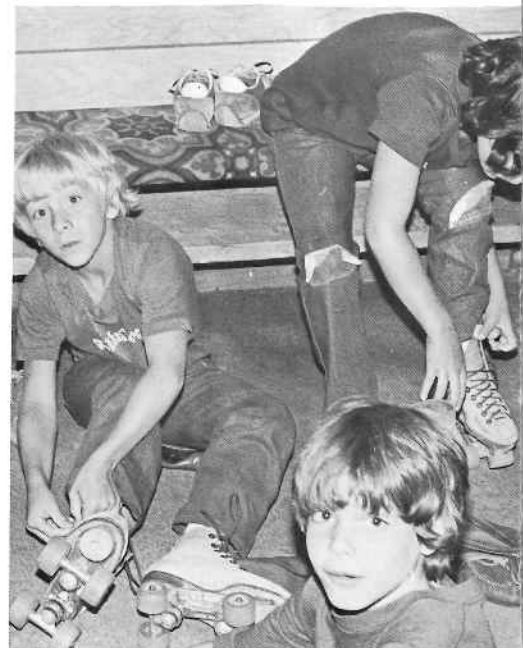

# ARTS & CRAFTS

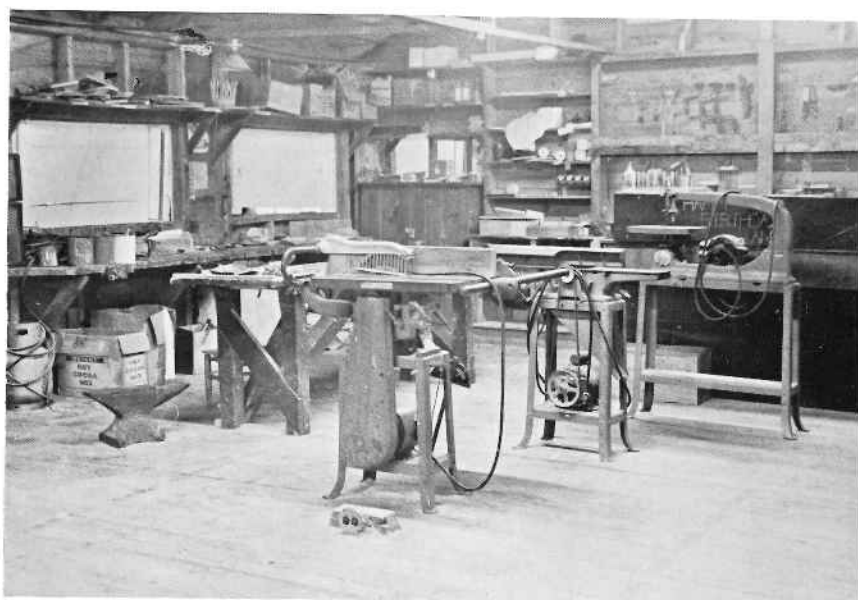
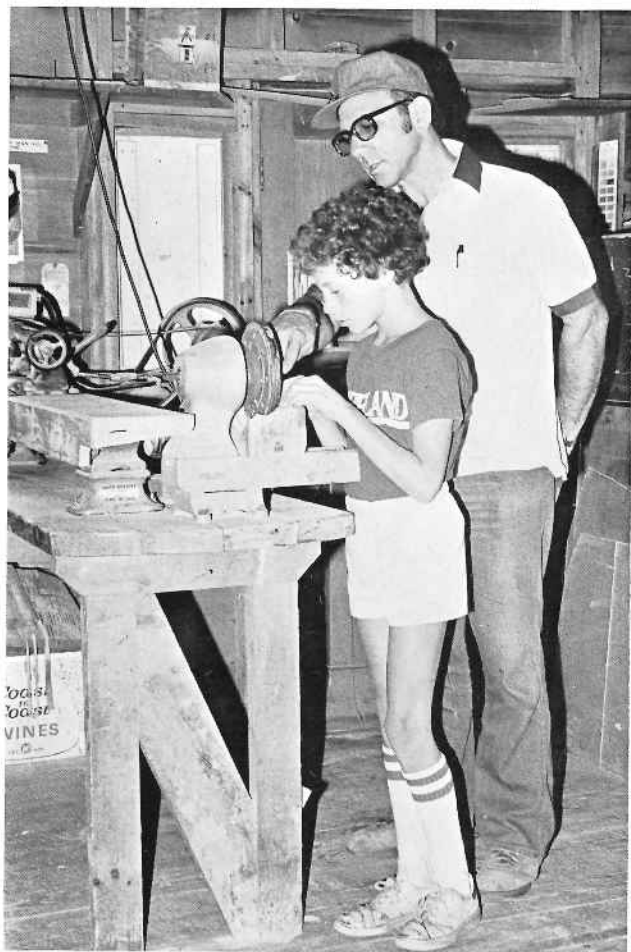

and started this summer trend. Juggler Jesse Flaxenberg's witch cup was one of the most colorful.

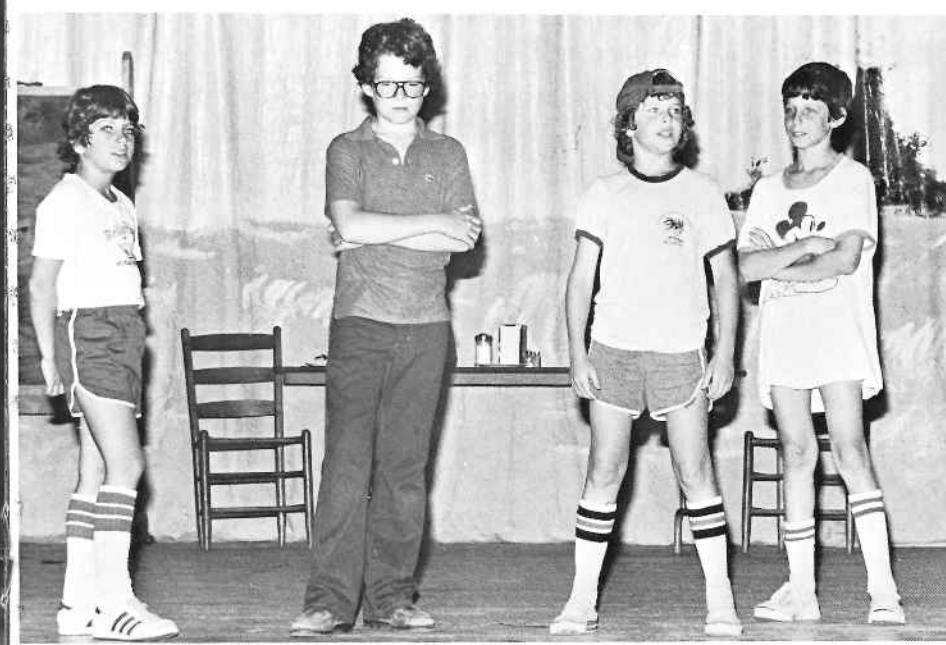
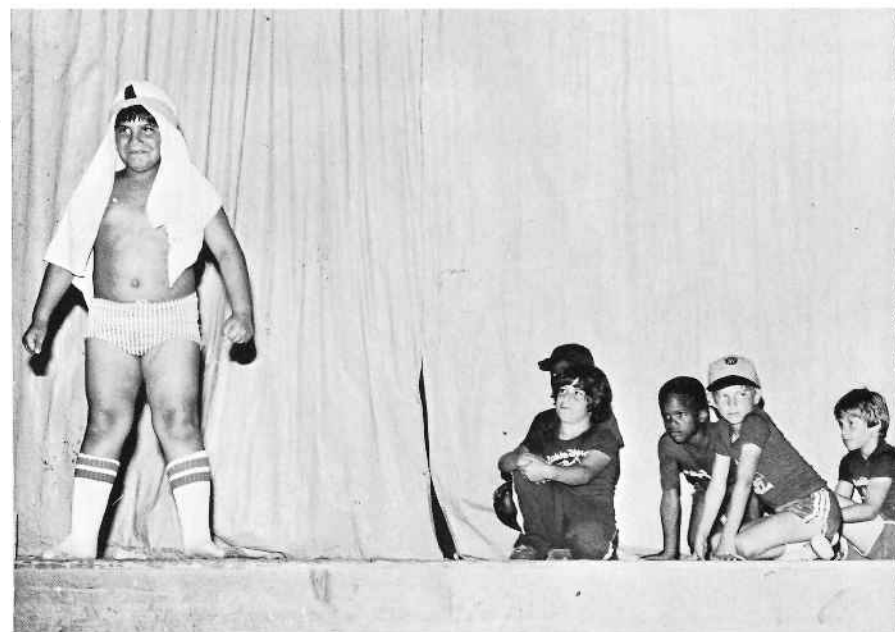

# HAM RADIO

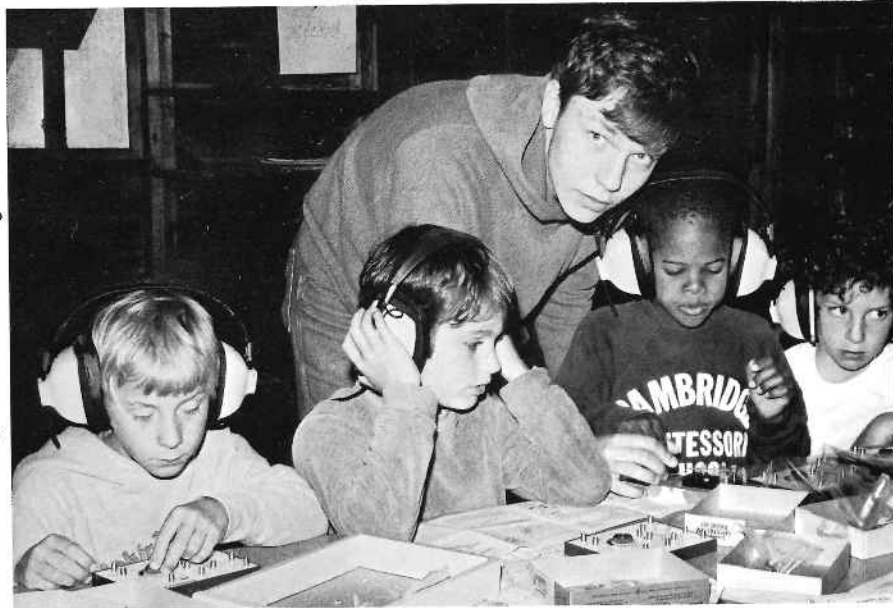
# ERIC JESSEN

## CHUCK DOWNIE



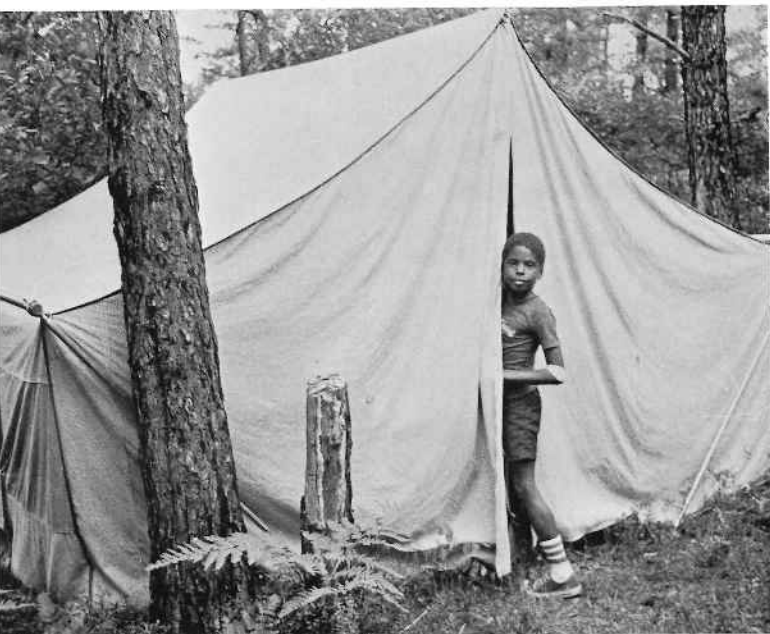
