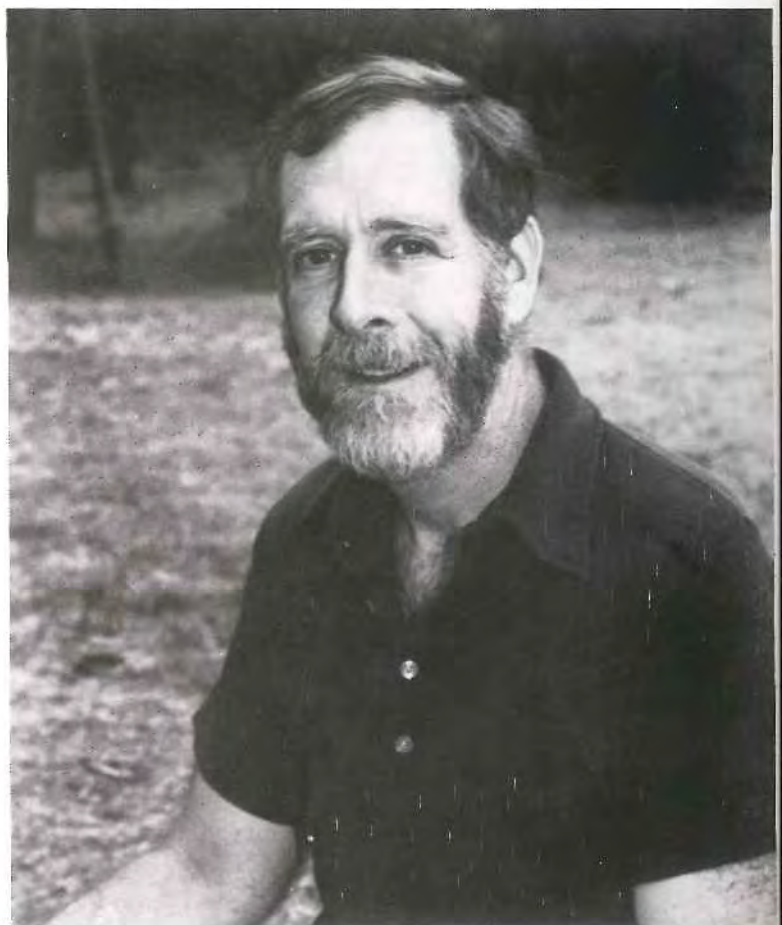

ARCHERY

STEVE MOSS

"John, come quickly, somebody's put an archery range at the Archery Range!" So began Robin Hood's first full season of Olympic-style target archery, picking up where my pilot program last summer left off. We started the season with not just six more targets, a bigger and better range and more composite recurve bows and aluminum arrows, but also a strong determination to turn archery into a major sport at Robin Hood.

The introduction of combined Target Sports into the Specialty Week was a big step. We were able to cover aspects of both archery and riflery that are not normally taught in either area. Beforehand we wondered whether this could ever work; after the first day we only wondered why we had never done it before. In particular, the use of video proved to be so valuable that it may in future be included as part of the regular program. Many graduates of the intensive program went on to represent RH on target teams.

The outcome of the first full team match against Camp Pemigewasset presented an opportunity to restructure the team at every level, replacing conscripts with volunteers whose energy and enthusiasm rapidly made up for their lack of match experience. Our tryout team defeated Camp Birchmont, setting the tone for our Big Event.

The First Annual Camp Robin Hood Archery Invitational was a great success, not only because our boys swept the team events, but also because (to the amazement of coaches from other camps) the tournament officials were mainly campers, scoring the targets, running the line and even being the Official Scorer (Corky Stern). The 13 and under scored an upset win over Pemigewasset, with Brian Halweil (256, 1st Place) and Matt Cohen (253, 2nd Place) being well supported by Jimmy Castle (230), Ken LaFreniere (220), Glenn Plosa (216) and Dale Murphy (203). The 15 and under overcame token opposition to win with Mike Reiss (263, 2nd Place) being backed up by Joey Saroken (226), Eric Nadler (218), Abdul Al Mutawa (213), Matt Black (170) and Matt Rubino. All six of our 11 and under boys placed in the top eight, with Mike Palys (220, 1st Place) leading the way followed by Todd Barnett, (198, 2nd Place), Evan Mizrachy (190, 3rd Place), Andy Isaacson (182), Mike Brewer (161) and David Sacerdote. Tanisha Jorsling (176) and Amanda Murphy (171) led the girls' team which also included Erika Halweil (151), Sandi Plosa, Lisa Haralambie and Jaime Markowitz.

Green and White saw many good contests, among them a remarkable battle in the Lancers, where Brian Halweil (259) was edged by Stefan Friedman (263), who scored the highest G&W score in camp for the 2nd year in a row and led his team to victory by 2 points. The season climaxed in the C.A.A. awards program when on the last morning the 50-meter record of 146 held by Mike Reiss and David Zindel fell twice: Stefan Friedman retook the record with 176 and Jimmy Castle later shot 150 in a high wind.



Todd Barnett rose with quiet determination to dominate Junior Camp and was awarded Best in Camp there. The Most Improved was easily Sandi Plosa with an Honorable Mention going to Jon Kauffman. The Freeman of the Forest Awards, which go to top archers who also perform an act of exceptional sportsmanship or service, went to Stefan Friedman and Tanisha Jorsling. They will now have the privilege of shooting on Target 1 in tournaments. The team MVP was Mike Reiss with Honorable Mention to David Zindel. Honorable Mentions for service went to Matt Black and Corky Stern. Rob Brinberg, Friedman and Matt Winitzer were named to the team on the basis of their late-season performances. The Award for Service to Traditional Archery was awarded to Marc Weinberger. The Best in Camp Trophy, awarded for effort and skill sustained over a whole season, was won jointly by Jim Castle and Brian Halweil who also tied for Most Improved.

On the final afternoon of the season I stood back from the range and watched as campers ran the line, scored the targets and helped each other shoot at 50 meters. As I reflected on the summer, I remembered the fine coaching of Alistair Blacklee and Matt Richards and the steady moral support and guidance of Hugo Valerio. I remembered the burning intensity of Mike Palys and the bubbling enthusiasm of Jim Castle and Matt Rubino. I remembered the powerful mastery of Reiss, the effervescent humor of Zindel and the irrepressible Josh Guttman. I remembered David Kampinski, Jon Leebow and Todd Dery coming down to the range to show me that they had talent too, and I remembered being impressed by what they showed me. I remembered Josh Benaim making his last award by the light from the stables and I remembered Sandi Plosa leaping in the air as she won her division in G&W. I remembered how people used to write home if they shot a bullseye and I remembered that Brian Halweil's new 20-meter record of 272 had 24 bullseyes in 30 shots, 10 of them in the inner. I even remembered a relaxing evening in the Pizza Barn where a waitress young enough to be my daughter somehow thought I was not old enough to drink.

It had been a summer of laying foundation and planting trees -- we had come a mighty long way.

11 & UNDER

The 11 & under team had a short season of two games - two playdays with Winaukee. The first game was a "lesson in learning" as they came out on the short end of a 49-12 score. Michael Brewer and Andy Isaacson played well for the Hooders. The second game was played at Winaukee and the RH "five" played a much better game in a second losing cause. The final score was 16-8. Matt Leebow spearheaded a strong 1-3-3 zone defense and Brewer and Michael Weinberg cleared the defensive boards. Brewer was top scorer with 4 points.

12 & UNDER

The 12 & under team earned a 4-1 record. There was a talented group of athletes in this age group and their play and record demonstrates that. The opening game was at home against Winaukee and resulted in a victory for RH. Game two was also against Winaukee on their home court and proved to be a good, close game with RH winning 40-35. The score was tied at the end of three quarters at 28 before the Hooders pulled it out in the last quarter, led by David Perlmutter's 8 points. Ken LaFreniere led the scoring with 18 followed by Jon Leebow and Perlmutter with 10 each. The team did a great job of breaking the Winaukee press. Game three was played at Camp Alton. RH led all the way in this one to win by the score of 29-17. LaFreniere led the scoring once again with 17 followed by Glenn Plosa's 7. LaFreniere, Perlmutter, and David Kampinski cleared the boards while Todd Dery at point guard sparked the team, especially in the second quarter, to put the game out of reach for Alton. Game four was a loss at Birchmont 30-18. There was a conflicting 13 & under game (Tri-State Tournament) and some members of the team played there for RH. Dery led the team in scoring with 6 points and Perlmutter had 5. Game five was a return match with Birchmont on our own court. The team was at full strength and it was no-contest as RH won easily. Birchmont proved to be less than graceful losers and the game was shortened by official's decision before the completion of the second quarter with the score 20-3 in favor of RH. The team was led in scoring by LaFreniere's 14 points on several fast breaks and by the point guard play of Glenn Plosa. The team's defensive play was excellent and thoroughly frustrated the Birchmonters - causing many turnovers that resulted in Plosa to LaFreniere layups.

13 & UNDER

The 13 & under team played its first game of the season as a team in its own tournament - without benefit of practice. They played as well as they could under the circumstances but, not surprisingly, came out on the short end of a 28-13 score to Winaukee. The Hooders were led in scoring by Josh Ralby with 5 points. It was a close game until the last quarter when Winaukee outscored RH 14-5 to seal their victory. Five days later (and one practice) they traveled to Winaukee to play in the Tri-State Tournament. Ten teams from Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire competed in this all-day-of-basketball program. RH played six games, won four of them and came in third overall in the tourney. They played four games in the morning in the qualifying round and defeated Merrimac 10-0, Winaukee Silver 10-3, Moosilauke 10-2 and lost only to Samoset by the score of 13-7. Their 3-1 record qualified the team to play in the afternoon in the "final four". The semifinal game was a controversial loss to Winaukee's Gold team by the score of 34-29. RH easily won the consolation game for third place against Cobbossee 41-33. On the day, RH scored a total of 107 points to the opposition's 84. Stefan Friedman (31), LaFreniere (29), Justin Weiss (24), Ralby (10) and Plosa (7) led the team scoring for the day. The team closed out its intercamp season when it traveled to Kezar Falls to play a strong West End team that had earlier won the Robin Hood Tournament. Although they lost 54-39, it was a good game and well played by both teams. The score at the half was 32-27 West End. RH was outscored 14-4 in the third quarter and could not recover from that deficit. Weiss led the scoring with 17 points. He was followed by Plosa and Ralby who each scored 6 points.

15 & UNDER

The 15 & under team had a losing record but did have a successful season! They grew together as a team as the summer wore on and we are certain that if we would have played later in the season those three games that were lost by 1 point, they would have become certain wins! The players worked hard to become an organized unit and to a great extent achieved their goal. From a spectator's point of view they were a terrific team to watch because every game was a battle right to the end and the team never gave up. Overtimes and 1-point decisions are always fun to watch. To get the season's first game under way at Winaukee, Doug Spear and Eric Nadler literally swept rainwater from the Winaukee Island court. Maybe they shouldn't have been so helpful because the visiting RH five then went down to defeat 35-29. The home team jumped out to a commanding 18-4 lead at the end of the first quarter. Following that inauspicious start the Hooders took control of the rest of the game and fell just 6 points short of a victory. The team was led in scoring by Doug Spear with 15 points -- 5 field goals and 5 for 6 foul shooting. Greg Cormier chipped in with 3 field goals and provided RH with a harassing, one man, full court defense that caused several Winaukee turnovers. Big Jess Gangi was a power in the center of the zone defense and hauled down many offensive and defensive rebounds. The next game at home in the evening against West End was an overtime thriller that was lost by 1 point 43-42. RH raced out to an 18-5 lead in the first quarter on some great outside shooting by Spear and "ET" Elisofon. Gangi provided strength underneath and converted two offensive rebounds into goals. RH also led at the half 21-10 and the third quarter by 27-24. The game was tied at the end of regulation 38-38. In the almost-dark overtime period West End scored 5 points to the Hooder's 4 to eke out a 1-point win. RH had a balanced attack and was led



in scoring by Cormier and Spear with 12 points each. Elisofon racked up 9, followed by Nadler with 5 and Gangi with 4. Elisofon, Spear and Nadler each hit a 3-point goal. The season's third game was also at home and was a "revenge is sweet" victory over Winaukee. This exciting (second consecutive overtime) game was also an evening contest played under the lights on senior court. The score at the end of the first half was 20-19 Robin Hood and at the end of regulation it was all tied at 30 points each. Cormier's 2 foul shots with seven seconds left put the game into overtime. Greg then scored 2 field goals and Spear hit for 2 fouls in the overtime to put the game away for RH. Cormier scored 14 points overall followed by Nadler with 8, Elisofon with 7 and Spear with 6. Gangi again controlled the offensive and defensive boards for RH. The next game was another thriller and was played on the indoor court at West End. This time the Hooders fell short of victory by 1 point 45-44 when a West Ender let fly a 25 foot shot that got nothing but net -- the final buzzer sounding as the ball was in the air! How aggravating!?! Two 1-point losses to West End in the same season. RH was led in scoring by Cormier who flipped in 8 field goals for 16 points. Gangi came alive offensively and poured in 6 baskets and 2 fouls for 14 and steady Elisofon added 8 points with 4 from the floor. Gangi, Steve Rhee and Spear pulled down 13, 10 and 9 rebounds as RH dominated the boards and had a team total of 43. RH jumped out to a quick lead and was ahead 12-8 at the end of the first quarter, 25-16 at the half and 34-29 at the 3/4 mark. The West Enders outscored RH 16-10 in the last quarter to dramatically pull the game out. The game was not without controversy and it was the opinion of many that although they tried their best, the officials had some weak moments at the end of the game. The fifth game of the season was at home against Alton. This was a really fine team effort on the part of RH and generated a decisive victory by the score of 47-27. RH jumped out to its usual quick lead in the first quarter 20-5. Spear and Gangi each tossed in 3 field goals to lead the rush. RH never relinquished the front running role after that. This game represented perhaps the team's best effort as a cohesive unit. Cormier was high scorer with 14 points closely followed by Gangi with 13. Spear tossed in 8, ET hit for 7 and Nadler netted a neat 3-point shot. RH again dominated the boards, out-rebounding Alton 39-17. Justin Weiss pulled down 5 points. Next on the agenda were the tournaments. The team really looked forward to participating in them but unfortunately were not as successful in them as they had hoped. They lost in the first round of the Robin Hood Tournament to the eventual tournament winner, Tecumseh, by the final score of 51-25. Tecumseh was clearly the most talented team in the tourney. RH actually gave them the best contest they were in all day. Tecumseh was up by 14 to begin the 4th quarter with RH, whereas with everyone else they played they led by 25 to 30 at the end of the first quarters! Cormier led RH in scoring with 9 points followed by Spear with 6. Gangi kept RH in the game with his offensive and defensive rebounding once again. The 15 & under season came to an end at Winaukee with participation in the Tri-State Tournament, an all-day round robin in which ten teams from Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire participated. In the time-shortened (10 minute) qualifying games in the morning RH results were as follows: RH 16 - Merrimac 14 (OT); RH 7 - Moosilauke 8; RH 11 - Winaukee Silver 7; RH 6 - Cedar 9. RH garnered a 2-2 record, losing only to Moosilauke by 1 point on a successful desperation shot and by 3 points to Camp Cedar, the eventual winner of the whole tournament. In the afternoon consolation games of 6 teams, RH results were as follows: RH - Bye first round; RH 25 - Merrimac 20 (consolation semifinal); RH 27 - Winaukee Gold 33 (consolation final). Scoring totals for the day were: Spear - 25; Gangi - 19; Cormier - 19; Elisofon - 16; Rhee - 11; Nadler - 2. WAIT TIL NEXT YEAR!!!

GIRL'S BASKETBALL 13 & UNDER

The Camp Robin Hood newspaper, "These 'N Those", was published regularly twice a week during the 1988 season. The summer of 1988 developed into another outstanding season for riflery at Sherwood Forest Rifle Range. By the end of the season, 35000 rounds had been fired and 165 shooters had come out to the range to shoot. Over 7000 targets were submitted for scoring and 104 boys and girls had earned their shooting awards, from Pro-Marksman (PM) through Expert. Among these 104 shooters, 270 levels of awards were earned.

Of the seventeen Friars who came to the range the most improved was Matt Winitzer, earning PM through Bar 7 (kneeling). He also was the high shooter of the group with a 91 in (prone). The most improved of the seventeen Foresters who came to riflery was Michael Reiss who earned two Expert ratings during the summer and who was also the high shooter of the Foresters with a 97 in (prone), 84 in (kneeling) and 77 in (standing), along with three 50's out of 50. We enjoyed the company of twelve Saxons who periodically came to the range to do some shooting.

The girls of Robin Hood developed a very strong enthusiastic group of young ladies who learned new and improved old shooting skills. The most improved young lady of the Arrows was Lesley Pelton, earning SS through Bar 4 in (sitting). She also was the high shooter with a 47 in (prone) and a 46 in (sitting). I have written this yearbook article for many years. Each year it becomes more of a struggle to report on the program in an original manner. Perhaps it is time to share with you some of the memorable and not so memorable moments of my fourteen years on the waterfront. For some, the memories may be as vivid as they are for me. For others, it will be a brief trip into the recent past.

Perhaps the most embarrassing moment occurred during leadership orientation in 1980. This was my first year as head of the waterfront. We were all in Drew's cottage discussing some aspect of the upcoming staff orientation. I happened to glance out the picture window and right before my eyes, floating down the channel, was one section of the three-piece orange dock. I realized that losing a dock was not a positive beginning to my tenure as head of the waterfront. To add insult to injury, one of my predecessors, Steve Carlson, had returned to be a group leader. He too witnessed this fiasco and had great fun reminding me of it all summer long. We managed to rescue the dock and secure it with the other two sections. I survived the embarrassment and learned from my mistake. Even Steve finally let me live it down.

Memories can be very special even if the moment was insignificant. One afternoon in 1975, my first summer, I was about to leave the waterfront to go to dinner. A few minutes earlier, Andy had passed by in his golf cart with a group of campers on board. As I left the boathouse I heard a call for help. Andy's overloaded golf cart couldn't make it up the hill by the Lancer bunks and began rolling backwards. Some counselors and I ran over and pushed him up the hill. Andy said thank you and continued on his way. It may not seem to be much of a memory, but any moment that involved Andy was special. Anyone who had the pleasure of knowing him, even as briefly as I, will agree.

The weather often dictates the program at a summer camp. This was very evident one evening during "Ninth Week" several years ago. We were in the dining hall for an evening activity when the wind picked up. The screen doors began whipping in and out. We walked down to check the waterfront and it was a sight that I have not seen since. The wind was howling and the cloudy sky had an eerie reddish color to it. The docks were at different angles, torn loose from their anchor lines. The lifeguard chair tower and a set of bleachers were bobbing up and down in the water. A rowboat and an aquacat were flipped over, lying haphazardly on top of a couple of minifish. A birch tree was torn from its base and was sprawled over a set of benches. A ski boat had broken loose and was being blown onto the rocks. We rescued the boat in time but couldn't accomplish anything else. The waterfront was a shambles and would not be used again that summer. Mother Nature had dictated policy and we had no say in the matter.

When a program has a "dry spell" with very little success over several years, it can be very memorable and exciting when the spell ends. This was the case with the Robin Hood swim teams in 1984. It was early July, and our teams were at Camp Winaukee for the Tri-State Swim Championships. I was nervous and irritable all day, waiting to hear the results. The phone finally rang and I was told that Robin Hood was the twelve and under champion. The excitement, pride and joy that welled up inside of me was too much to contain. I ran around like a raving lunatic, hollering the results. It meant so much to know that we could win; that we could be successful. It was a turning point for the program and a much-needed shot of confidence for me.

I hope that you have enjoyed this brief look into the recent past. It is time to return to the present. The Robin Hood waterfront enjoyed another safe and productive summer, thanks to the efforts of all the staff and campers.

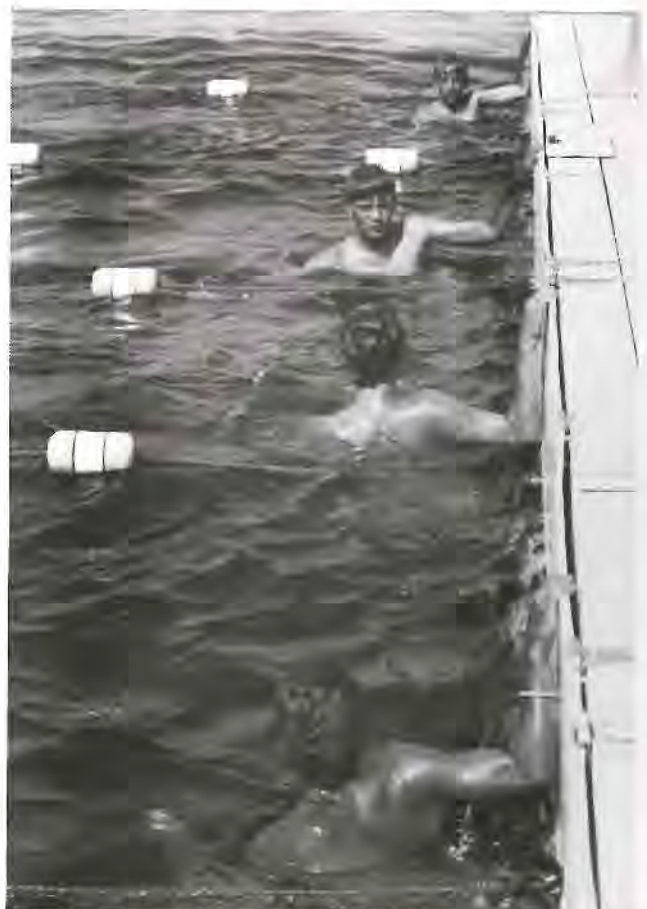

TENNIS

Participants were made aware that to be a champion, learning good tennis is not enough but must be backed up by knowledge of theory on courts and equipment, styles of play and players, tactics, analysis of performance and feed-back, physical fitness, mental fitness, etc. The response of the participants whether beginners or advanced was excellent and it was heartening to hear in later days beginners saying "I should have tried a defensive lob" or "I should have smashed on the fly". Thus, the specialty week was a great success.

This year a great emphasis was made on instruction and importance of control and consistency. It was also explained that scrambling (to return the ball to the other side even at cost of other requirements) is most important. All campers started to improve the number of returns on a competition basis. The start was made by 36 returns by Mike Brewer and reached a record 93 returns (186 rallies) by the Squire Jon Kauffman! Stress was also laid on the tactics of tournament play both in singles and doubles matches. Those who took to this improved remarkably and went up the ladder like Greg Cormier and Evan Mizrachy. All in all, it was a summer of excitement and learning at Camp Robin Hood.

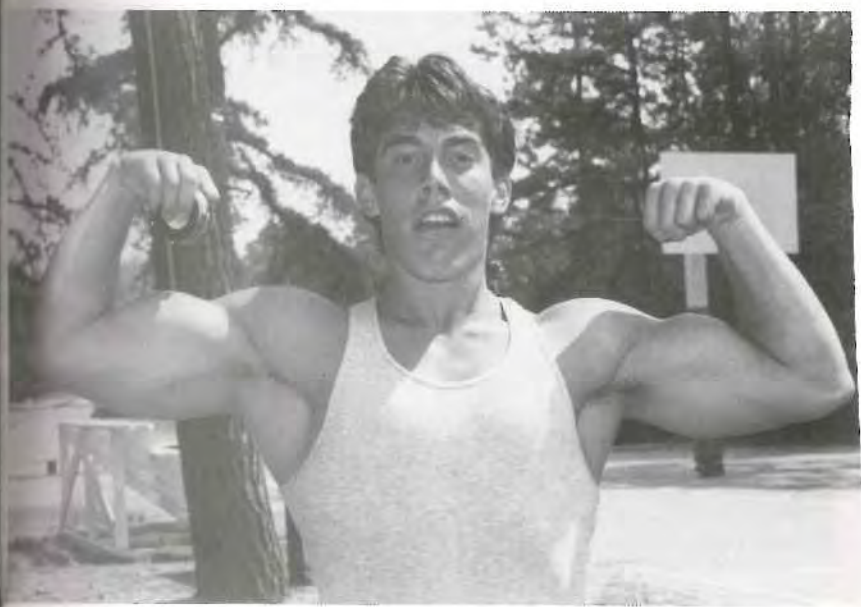

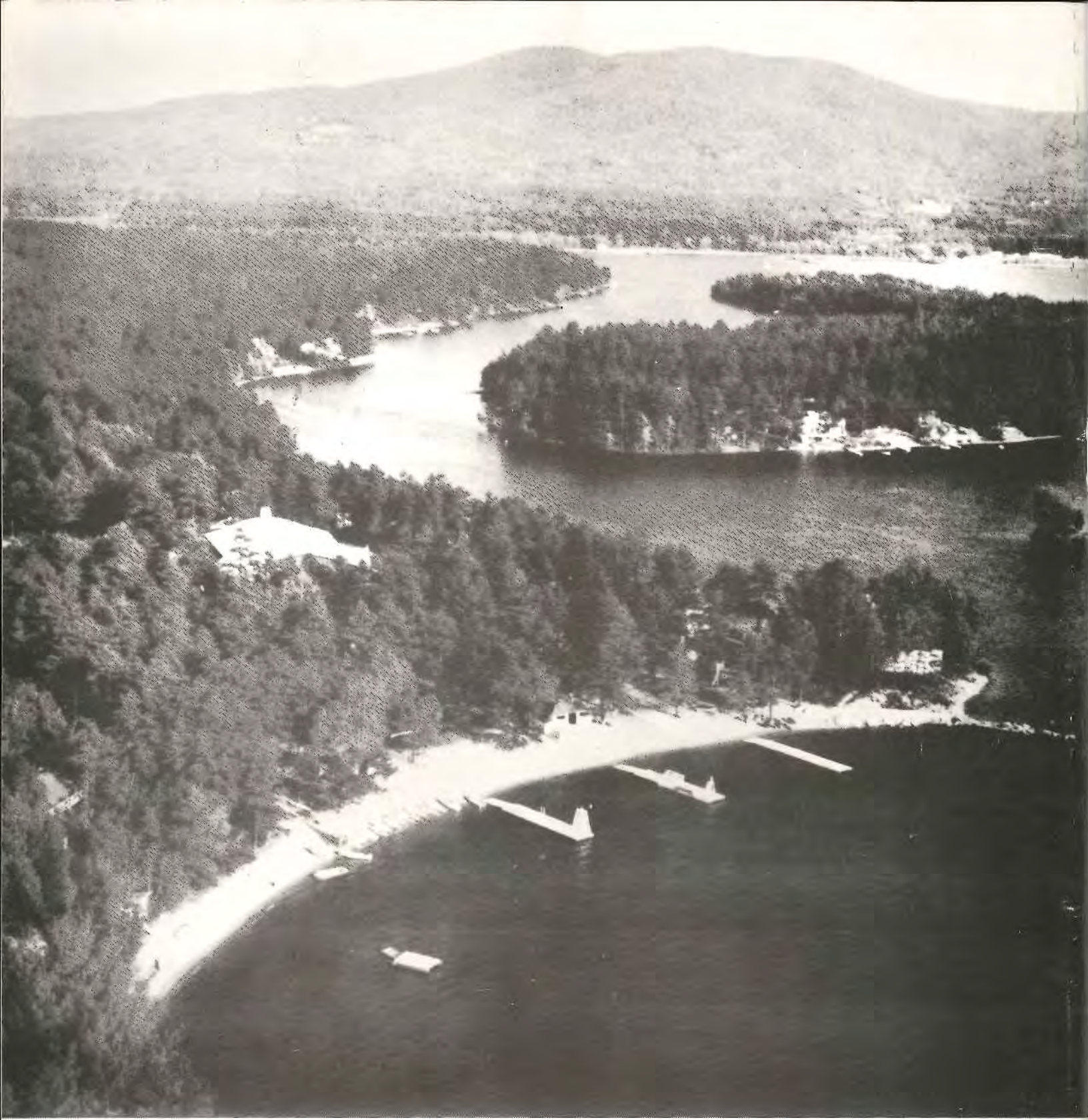
