Remember... the Todd Dery memorial B.I.C. tennis tournament... the T2 shirt... George's morning glory... when Julie and Evan switched groups for the day...

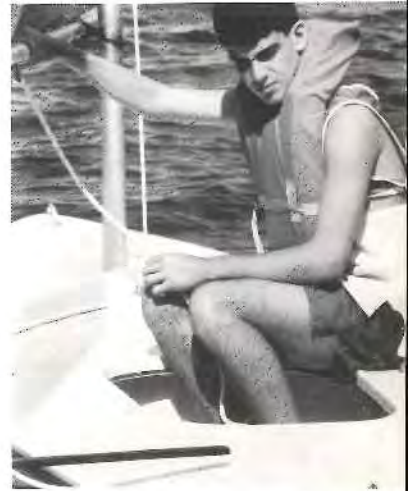

With a day of activities behind them, one would expect that this group would rest their weary heads when evening came. This was not so with this energetic and enthusiastic group. # ARCHERY

Union, True Heart and Courtesy."

(August 1866)

The motto of the British Grand National Archery Society seems to fit in so well with the principles and aims of Camp Robin Hood. Archery has always been an important activity here, and I feel proud to continue the tradition, keeping the spirit of Robin Hood alive.

With a recently built archery shack, bursting with olympic-style, modern target bows; sixteen targets; enough arrows to start a war and a freshly mown archery range, I decided upon the two main objectives for the Robin Hood campers: To achieve high scores and to have fun!

The specialty week fell upon us very quickly and I am happy to report that we successfully achieved high scores and had a lot of fun in the process. The first two days were spent on individual coaching, including the use of video, warm-up routines and some discussions on the principles of sighting and shooting. Day three involved shooting for Camp Archery Association awards - congratulations to Charlie Newman and Jon Kauffman, who both qualified as First Rank Archers at thirty yards. Also to Luci Martinez, who shot double the score she needed to qualify! Day four was simply assigned to fun shooting - at cardies, balloons and posters. Remember Clout shooting, at 120 yards - shooting up into the air to land your arrow onto the target on the ground. It wasn't easy, was it!? We finished specialty week by shooting apples off of Robin Hood's head! (Thanks for the poster, Jeremy!)

This year's archery matches all happened to fall within the same week - and what a busy week that was... The first match was our very own - The Fourth Annual Robin Hood Invitational Archery Tournament - The morning's shooting in the 11-and-under division between the two boys' teams from Indian Acres and Robin Hood, began at 10:30 a.m. in a sweltering ninety-five degree heat. Indian Acres was shooting very well and outclassed the archers from Robin Hood. Despite our preparation and training, as well as an excellent performance from Shawn Clyman (252), when the scores were totalled, we were beaten by 173 points.

The 13-and-under trophy was hotly contested by teams again from Indian Acres and Robin Hood, and also a girls' team from Forest Acres. As the scores came in, it became clear that this was going to be a high-scoring and very close contest between Indian Acres and Robin Hood. Outstanding high scores from Theo Gangi (260), Aaron Schildkraut (256), and Shawn Clyman (245), all contributed to our hard-fought victory, with a score of 1175, beating Indian Acres by only 59 points, to retain our 13-and-under title. The 15-and-under division between the senior girls of Forest Acres and the young men of Robin Hood, began at 2:30 p.m., long after the bug juice had run out! The girls were shooting well, and it took some first-rate shooting from our team to ultimately triumph. However, with Theo Gangi (254), Eric Bailey (253), Aaron Schildkraut (266) and Charlie Newman (236), all in top form, we won by a comfortable 150 points to win the division. Overall, a friendly and sportsman-like afternoon's shooting, with the heat doing little to dispel our enthusiasm. Robin Hood had excellent results in two out of three divisions - not a bad day!

The day after the Invitational Archery Tournament was a friendly match against the 12-and-under and 15-and-under teams from Camp Tecumseh. The afternoon heat was stifling and the bug juice didn't last long that day either, but everyone was in good spirits and shooting continued at a leisurely pace. Robin Hood had the advantage, using bows equipped with sights, while Tecumseh preferred "instinctive" shooting, without sights. We had some fun near the end of the competition, when we swapped equipment, and I think both teams got quite a shock at how different the two styles were! Robin Hood won the tournament by a reasonable margin in both divisions. Thanks must go to all the staff who assisted in the organization and helped out, and to the archers of Camp Tecumseh, for being such friendly competitors. In the 12-and-under event, there were meritorious performances from Jon Feigenbaum, Toby Stern, Josh Bailey and Andres Castro. In the 15-and-under event, Aaron Schildkraut, Theo Gangi and Rick Bailey all shot high scores.

Well, we had one day's rest, then we were off to an away match at Camp Cedar in Maine. They were holding an open tournament for the six best archers from each camp, with ten camps from Maine and New Hampshire. The ten camps weren't all shooting at the same time, so our scheduled "slot" was mid-afternoon, around 2:30. Some excellent scores from Theo Gangi (265), Glenn Plosa (256), and David Zindel (256), pushed our team total score to 1461 - only eight points behind the winners - the team from Camp Caribou. We came so close, but were still pleased to have come in second out of ten camps, with Theo taking an individual third.

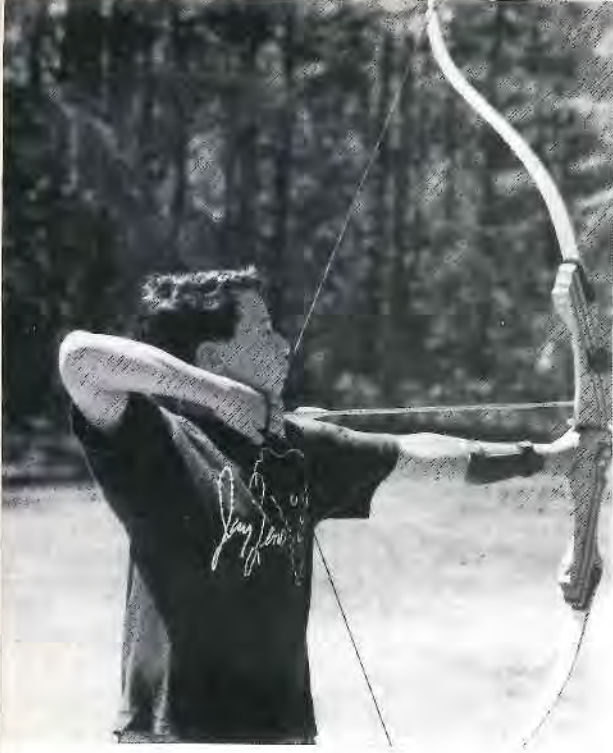
I think the most memorable moment of Green & White has to be when David Gershenson shot a "perfect 30" on the last round of the Forester/Saxon match, to clinch it for the Green team by three points! I must commend both teams for their gentlemanly conduct and sportsmanship during the match. (I know, Saxons - gentleman? - but I did see it, honest!!)



The archery awards were a difficult choice, with so many outstanding archers, and so many improvers. After much deliberation, the Best in Camp Award, for effort and skill, was awarded to Rick Bailey, for his persistence and consistent high scores. The Most-Improved Award, I decided to award to David Gershenson, who, having started from scratch this summer, spent so much time helping and shooting on the range, and eventually qualifying as an American Archer - the highest award. Congratulations to both of you. I am sure that your enthusiasm will bring even higher scores to you in the future. I must mention some of the others who made the choice so difficult - Aaron Schildkraut, Dave Zindel, Theo Gangi, Glenn Plosa, Tom Burns, Andres Castro, Charlie Newman and Jon Feigenbaum. Good job, guys. I'm proud of all of you.

# INTER-CAMP ATHLETICS



It was a great year for Baseball and Softball at the Realm in 1991. This was my third year as the director of Baseball Operations and it seems the third one was a charm. In addition, when John spoke to me in February, he asked if I would work with the girls. I had had some experience with girls' teams at the high school level, so I said sure, and I am very happy I did. As it turned out, I coached a total of seven teams to a record of 12-11-1, but most importantly, brought two championship trophies back to the Realm. Thank you all, who coached, officiated or just cheered our teams on. A special thanks to those of you who assisted in keeping an eye on Sarah and John during games and practices. Finally, thanks to Joan, Chuck, Chuck and John for supporting me in every way. Now a quick run-down of the highlights of each team.

## SOFTBALL

### 12-And-Under

This team's lone game was against Birchmont at home. They started slowly, giving up five runs in the first inning. In the fourth inning, big hits by Jamie Koss, Daniela Harris and Emily Sagalyn produced three runs to make it 5-4. Birchmont answered with two runs in the sixth, before Lizzy Whitehorn and Kathy Newman hit back-to-back homeruns to tie the game at seven. Despite loading the bases in the bottom of the seventh, we were unable to score and had to settle for a tie. The girls were ecstatic. They showed a lot of spunk and gave much hope to future Robin Hood teams.

### 13-And-Under

The thirteen and under softball team compiled a 1-2 record. They lost two and won one. The first game, versus a strong Birchmont team, could have gone either way. After falling behind 5-0, our defense settled down and we held them scoreless the rest of the way. Several rallies fell just short and we went down to defeat 5-1. Jamie Koss pitched well and scored our lone run. Lisa Haralambie, Robyn Sulzer, Alli Agin and Daniela Harris played very well. In our second game, we travelled to Wicosuta. Again, Jamie Koss pitched - with more success this time. The offense was led by Lisa Haralambie, who blasted two homeruns. The final score was 4-2. Our final game was played extremely shorthanded, against the same strong Birchmont team, and resulted in a 24-2 loss. This is a team that is sure to win more than they lose, in the future.

### 15-And-Under

This championship team had it all. They worked hard at practice, listened well during the games, played tight defense, hit the cover off the ball and ran the bases with abandon. In addition, they had great leaders, which led to poised play and a 4-1 record.

The 15-and-under team finished with a 2-3 record. Mike Feiner got us off to a good start, pitching a seven-hitter, while striking out twelve in a 7-4 win over Alton. Feiner also led the way offensively, driving in three runs with a single and a double. Our second game was truly unusual. Winaukee, our opponent, arrived an hour late, but with their hitting shoes on. They scored six runs in the first two innings, in what would turn out to be a three inning game. Matt Wechsler came in to pitch, with one out in the second inning, and put out the fire. Entering the final inning, we trailed 6-1. A series of hits by Todd Dery, Matt Wechsler and Jack Weiner, sandwiched around several walks, led to a 6-5 score, with two outs and the bases loaded. While the Winaukee coach screamed at Brian Ratner for being out of position, we scrambled about, trying to get Todd Dery back to bat. He had left after scoring to prepare for the basketball game to follow. When the dust cleared, Winaukee pulled the hidden-ball trick while their pitcher was on the mound. West End was our next opponent. (They were a powerful team that would come back to win the Robin Hood Tournament by combined score of 58-2.) The final was 12-1, but we found no shame in losing to this multi-talented team.

Our most disappointing game came in our tournament versus Belknap. After taking a 7-2 lead, we fell behind 8-7. Most disheartening was the fact that Belknap scored eight runs on just one hit. A 10-and-under, "A" team, made up of players from the Squire bunk, traveled to Camp Winaukee for an early season playday contest. The 13-and-under "A" team easily dispensed with Camp Birchmont in a playday encounter, with a score of 48-32. Robin Hood jumped into a quick lead by the end of the first period. Birchmont crept back a little in the second stanza and the half ended with the score of 18-11, in favor of Robin Hood. In Game One, the 14's opened up nervously against the tall, strong, home team and were soundly defeated 9-24. Tecumseh was the eventual tournament winner. However, in Game Two, the Hooders came back strongly against Marist and trounced them 34-14. Game Three of the morning was played with Birchmont, who previously had defeated Robin Hood in a playday contest at home. Robin Hood easily avenged that loss with a score of 31-12. After the lunch break, Robin Hood seemed to lose the momentum they had acquired in the morning, and lost Game Four to Winaukee, 21-29. The team thus earned third place in the tournament. The 14's were led in scoring that day by Friar Mike Brewer, who played very well the whole day. Mike scored 72 of Robin Hood's total point production of 95 in the four games. Mike Deatly set up several of the goals with 24 assists. Also playing well for the Hooders were Mike Rosen, Jeff Jablow, Jordan Strauss, Aaron Rosenfeld, Jason Finkel, Kevin Palmer, Ben Brody and Brian Snyder.

#### 15-And-Under Games

Three days after camp opened, the young Robin Hood 15-and-under boys' team opened the inter-camp season with a loss in a night contest at West End Camp. The always electric atmosphere in the jam-packed, noisy "House," and the experienced West Enders, combined to defeat the "short-on-practice" Robin Hood five, 53-30. The game was virtually decided in the first quarter, when the full court, trapping, zone press defense of West End stymied Robin Hood and allowed them to race into a 26-5 lead. Once Robin Hood recovered from their first-quarter jitters, they settled down nicely and played their opponent even-up, and in fact, out scored them in the second half. However, the first quarter's 21 point deficit proved to be too much to overcome. Robin Hood was led in scoring by Mike Feiner with 13, Mike Brewer with 8 and Glenn Plosa with 6. Plosa also pulled down 7 rebounds, to lead the Hooders in that statistic.

It was in Game Two that the boys' team broke into the win column, at their first home game of the season. This playday contest with Winaukee resulted in a decisive 31-18 victory for the Hooders. Saxon Glenn Plosa lead the team in scoring, with seven field goals for 14 points. Forester Jon Fink tossed in 5 points in the first half, and Saxon Mike Feiner and Friar Mike Brewer aided the effort with 4 points each.

For their third game of the season, the boys' 15-and-under team traveled to Camp Winaukee for a night game. The host neatly wrapped up a 45-27 win for themselves. The first quarter was well played by both teams and was closely contested. The score was 16-14, in favor of Winaukee, at the end of one. The second quarter proved to be the downfall for Robin Hood, when they were outscored 18-8, making the first half totals 34-22, Winaukee. Leading the effort for Robin Hood was Glenn Plosa, with 12 points and 10 rebounds, supported by 9 points from Mike Feiner and 6 from Mike Brewer.

Visiting Camp Birchmont was subjected to a convincing defeat at the hands of the Robin Hood's 15-and-under team in their fourth game. This, in spite of the fact that Glenn Plosa could only play about one quarter of the game due to an injured knee, and Mike Feiner lost some playing time for the same reason. The Hooders jumped out to a 12-4 lead at the end of the first stanza. Birchmont made a small run in the second period, to draw within 16-12. In the second half, Robin Hood pulled away to a comfortable lead and maintained it. The final score (34-25) was the closest Birchmont came to the Hooders by virtue of a successful, desperation, three-point shot at the final buzzer. Leading scorers for Robin Hood were Todd Dery and Mike Brewer, with 9 points each. Plosa and Feiner contributed 6 each and Todd Adelstein had 4.

The boys' 15-and-under team really came to play at the ROBIN HOOD INVITATIONAL BASKETBALL TOURNAMENT! They had been developing nicely as a team prior to this annual single-elimination contest, which turned out to be their "finest hour as a unit!" They almost "grabbed the brass ring" in the marathon, all day event, but fell four points short in the finals to their nemesis, West End Camp. This was the best team effort of the summer for this squad. A total of 15 teams were in the Realm to compete for the championships in the 13-and 15-and-under divisions, on the hot and humid courts of Robin Hood. GAME ONE: The day began well for the Hooders in the opening round game against Camp Wigwan from Maine. The contest was virtually decided in the first quarter, when Robin Hood streaked to a 20-5 advantage, led by Glenn Plosa's 16 points on eight long-range field goals, the first seven in a row! The margin increased at the half to 31-11, and to 45-18 after three quarters. The final score ended 58-32. Mike Brewer added to the fun with seven baskets in the second half, when Wigwan went to a "box and one" zone to stop Plosa. Leading scorers were Plosa with 23, Brewer with 16 and Mike Feiner with 8. Mike Feiner, Todd Adelstein and Jon Fink each scored 6 in a fine, total team effort. Game Two was with Samoset, whose full court press unraveled the Hooders. Robin Hood ended up on the short end of the 23-27 score. Brewer led again with 12 points, followed by 7 from Feiner and 4 from Adelstein. They were the only Robin Hood players who scored. When July 12th rolled around, the grizzled veterans, returning from the Tri-State teams, put on their game faces for the Samoset Invitational. Without capturing a single first place, the 11-, 13- and 15-and-under teams displayed their amazing depth, carrying yet another Overall Meet trophy to the Realm for a victory lap and a trip to Disneyland. The 15-and-under swimmers made a tremendous sacrifice in order to make the championship possible, foregoing a social at Wicosuta. There were a couple of impressive swims in the 15's age division, in which we placed second. Eve and Hayley were very creative in their photography. They experimented by taking pictures of garbage cans, toilet bowls, headless people, mirror images, feet without bodies, etc. Keep it up, Eve and Hayley, that is a great way to learn what works and what doesn't in photography.

The Arrows and Shires were content to take pictures and print camp negatives. Only Lindsay Hochman and Sandi Plosa loaded exposed film in the dark and processed their own negatives. The Shires had fun making many prints of their very successful climb of Mt. Katahdin. These fine pictures were taken by Asst. Program Director, Dave "Freaky" Freedman, and Group Leader, Julie Morris.

It was great fun having the Pager-Jugglers right next door to the darkroom. They were very interested in catching squirrels. When they caught one, they would have me take a close-up picture of it and then they would let it go. They would come to the darkroom during photo class and rest periods to make copies of the squirrel pictures. The most frequent squirrel-printers were Eduardo Capriles, Bjorn Kruse, Santiago Martinez and Diego Prieto. Bjorn's favorite expression as each squirrel picture came visible in the developer was "Oh, he's sooo cute!". Group Leader Steve Rupp assisted me in getting four PJ's to load exposed film onto a processing reel. They were Brad Friedman, Diego Prieto, Matt Rosenfeld and Danny Wilarsky. Abraham Spitz was able to do it all by himself, without our assistance. The most frequent darkroom participant was Eduardo Capriles. Every spare moment he had was spent practicing photographic skills: he took pictures, loaded film in total darkness, processed film, helped mix chemicals and made 5x7 enlargements. Because of his practice and progress, he received the Photographic Award for Progress and Achievement (Most Improved Camper) in Junior camp. That was a great accomplishment for a PJ!

The most frequent attendees for the Squires were Lowell Jacobson, Chris Khoury, Josh Morgan, Cassidy Podell, Adam Rothschild and Josh Weiner. During Parents' Weekend, Josh Morgan and his father exposed a roll of black and white film, which Josh soon loaded and processed. For the next two weeks, Josh was in the darkroom every spare rest period that he had. He became quite an experienced darkroom technician, because he made 5x7 enlargements of all 24 negatives on the roll. The Squire that walked away with the Photography Award for Effort and Skill (Best in Junior Camp) was Adam Rothschild. He was in the darkroom for about 40 activity or rest periods, asking questions and practicing his photographic skills. He exposed film, loaded film in the total darkness, processed film and made 5x7 prints. In addition, he made black and white prints from color negatives, constructed a pinhole camera and made negative-image prints with it. He is the first camper to make a pinhole camera in my four years at Camp Robin Hood!

Yeoman Richard Gordon demonstrated his photographic knowledge and skill by making photograms and prints for the TNT Newspaper, by helping his White Team win points in the photo contest and by helping other campers with camera problems or special negative-binding problems. Yeoman Shawn Clyman won the Photographic Award for Progress and Achievement (Most Improved Camper) in Senior Camp by his steady and consistent processing and printing of quality prints for the White Team, which won 10 of the 25 contest points. The Green Team won the photo contest with 15 points, thanks to the photographic expertise and organizing ability of Saxon Jack Weiner. Thanks for your welcome and good-byes and I'll try my utmost to be here next year. I already have new plans in the pipeline.

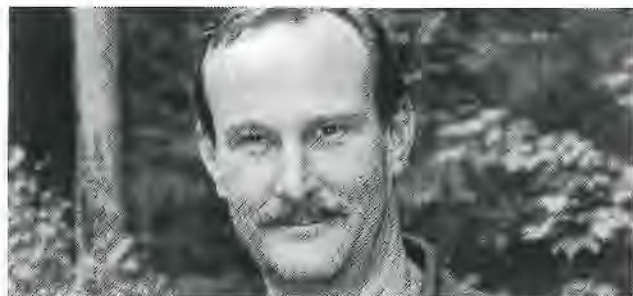


## RIFLERY

The summer of 1991 reached an all-time high in all levels of riflery at the Sherwood Forest Rifle Range. By the end of the season 42,500 rounds had been fired and a large section of the camp came out to the range to shoot. Over 7,000 targets were submitted for scoring and 93 boys and 20 girls earned shooting awards: From Pro-Marksman (PM) through Expert 2. Among these, 316 levels of awards were earned.

Of fifteen RT's, twelve earned twenty five different levels of awards. The most improved in this group is Jay Klein, earning Sharpshooter through Bar 1. The two high shooters of the group were Eduardo Capriles and Jay Klein, both shooting a high score of 82. There are fifteen Squires who also came to riflery to learn new shooting skills. Nine earned eighteen different levels of awards with Carlos Prieto earning Pro-Marksman through Bar 1 (prone). Carlos was the high shooter of the group shooting 90. Twenty Archers came to riflery as many times as were available, to learn new, and to improve on old shooting abilities. Fifteen earned forty-four different levels of awards. The most improved learner was Jeffrey Squires, earning MM 1st through Bar 6 (kneeling), who was also the best shooter in the group by shooting 91. Thirty-four Yeomen came to riflery to learn new and to improve on old shooting abilities. Twenty earned seventy-six different levels of awards. The most improved shooters were Josh Slater, earning MM through Bar 7 (kneeling), with Ari Kandel and Shawn Clyman, both earning Expert. The high shooter of the group was Shawn Clyman, who shot a 50 out of 50. Twenty-six Lancers came to riflery to expand on those skills already learned, with eighteen earning forty-two different levels of awards. The two most improved were Bryan Smith, earning Bar 3 (sitting) through Bar 6 (kneeling) and Albert Cohen, earning Expert. The high shooter of the group was Albert Cohen with a 96. Thirty-two Friars came to riflery to have fun and to improve on their skills. Thirteen earned thirty different levels of awards. Charlie Newman earned SS (prone) through Bar 4 (sitting), followed by Michael Weinberg, who earned Expert. Michael was also the high shooter of the group, shooting a 50 out of 50. Of nine Foresters, a select number came out to the range. Two earned seven different levels of awards. Eduardo Meylan attained FM (prone) through Bar 1, followed by Michael Soltoff, who earned Bar 3 and 4 (sitting). The best shooter of the group was Michael Soltoff, shooting a 50 (sitting). The Saxons also did some heavy duty shooting with four earning thirty-nine different levels of awards. David Gershenson shot three Expert ratings. Jeff Josephson shot an additional two Expert ratings, completing a total of five, with David Zindel shooting six different Expert ratings in one summer! Jeff Josephson and David Zindel were the high shooters of the group, with Jeff shooting a 50 out of 50 and David shooting a 100 out of 100. The Jesters came and all 17 learned new skills. Five earned seven different levels of awards. The two most improved were Lauren Soloway, who earned MM 1st and SS, and Amy Whiting who also earned SS. The high shooter of the group was Amy Whiting who shot 49 out of 50.

Eleven Bows earned eighteen different levels of awards. The two most improved Bows were Jillian Markowitz (MM 1st and SS) and Ruth Nadler (MM 1st and SS). Maggie Goldwasser was the high shooter, shooting a 46 (prone). In the Arrows group, Lisa Haralambie was the most improved by earning bar 2 (sitting) followed by Emily Sagalyn who attained MM through Bar 1. Emily was the high shooter of the group, shooting a 96. Sarah King of the Shires earned SS. The two best shooters were the Pelton twins, both shooting a score of 88.
