Remember the cookouts with the girls ... dancing to the music ... cleaning up afterwards -- we don't! ... keeping away from the fire - we don't! ... the awesome




Olympic-style archery arrived at Robin Hood in 1987, complete with targets that take two people to lift, take-apart bows fitted with tournament sights and stabilizer sets ("...does it pick up chanel 4?"), and lightweight aluminum arrows that not only come in handy for spearing delicacies at the Visiting Day buffet, but also group well when you shoot them at 50 yards. The new equipment needed new techniques, and coaches Jim Gallacher and Steve Moss taught campers to shoot the same way as they do themselves in tournaments. The same style of shooting can be found in any target archery club at home.

The most success in the C.A.A. award scheme was achieved by those who put in the most work in learning how to use the new equipment. It is no coincidence that the greatest strength was found in Gallacher's Squires and Moss's Yeomen.

Josh Lawch dominated Junior Camp with the highest award level and the highest score in Green and White. Todd Barnett narrowly won the "Most Improved" award in Junior Camp, combining enthusiasm with hard work. Jeff Jablow and Matt Cohen received an "Honorable Mention" and Mike Brewer, Josh Guttman, Eric Jelin, Albert Cohen and Jon Kauffman can expect to be in the running for next year's teams.

Jack Weiner won the "Most Improved" award in Senior Camp, reaching Silverbow Archer Sharpshooter before his 12th birthday. Jeff Josephson, another graduate of the Whitby Slave Labor Program, and Joey Fishman received an "Honorable Mention". The Green and White performances of Nick Coslov, David Horowitz and





Garrett Graue bode well for the future, and Scott Elisofon showed glimpses of past glories. Steve Goulder and Eric Boyriven have great promise and we suspect that Gary Greaves could show as much in archery as he has done in riflery.

The board was swept by Stefan Friedman. A virtual beginner this summer, he obtained the highest score in the whole camp in Green and White. According to past yearbooks and the famous Naif Al Mutawa memory bank, nobody has ever progressed beyond Silver Bow Archer First Rank (130 points at 40 yards) while still a camper. Stefan, at the age of 12, scored 161 at 40 yards (needing 160) for Silver Bow Archer Sharpshooter. Two days later, at the crack of dawn, Stefan blew away American Archer with 139 points at 50 yards (needing 100).

For the record, the archery stars in the 1987 Robin Hood video were Jeff Jablow, Joey Fishman, Jack Weiner and Stefan Friedman. The most amazing event of the summer was Fahed Al Mutawa's trick shot, when Todd Barnett shot an arrow at the target and Fahed shot it out of the air.

We look forward to 1988 with a bigger and better range, more new equipment, an extra award scheme, team events against other camps, and the First Annual Robin Hood Invitational Archery Tournament.

ARTS & CRAFTS

HUGO VALERIO


WENDELL HURT














GREEN & WHITE

13 & UNDER






14 & UNDER


SOCCER

gasping.




The spotlight shines on Saxon Evan Kern for always trying to get up on one ski and skiing beautifully by the end of the year.

And that sums up the year in waterskiing as the sun sets behind the White Mountains and the water calms down and I pump the boats out one more time.


